

ORPHAN CHILDREN GIVEN BIG FEED

HUNDRED AND TWENTY FIVE CHILDREN MADE HAPPY BY LOCAL CITIZENS

Financed principally by Shriners and Rotarians, the annual Thanksgiving dinner of the Salvation Army, given yesterday at the Orphans' Home at San Jacinto Heights, was one of the most successful and satisfactory ever staged by that organization in its long and honorable history. A total of 125 children were given a big turkey feed with all the trimmings, who otherwise would have fasted almost, indeed, at the conclusion of the feast a cheer and a vote of thanks were given to the Shriners and Rotarians and to R. H. McCorkle and Ross D. Rogers, who represented those organizations and made all arrangements with the Salvation Army for the dinner.

At a little after twelve o'clock forty six little tots sat down to the first table and stuffed themselves with the good things provided in unnumbered to cause the gravest alarm to 75 others, who stood watching them with mouths watering, for the forty six certainly did more than justice to the feed and it seemed that they would never stop eating. But there was no need for the fear of the seventy nine who had perforce to wait; when the children at the first table had finished and eaten all they possibly could hold, the tables were replenished and when the second quota of children sat down there was as much for them as there had been for the first table full. Similarly with the third table. When the last of the little tots had finished and admitted with a happy scrow that there was room for no more turkey, no more cranberries, no more candy, nuts, oranges, apples, bananas or any of the other delicious foods with which the tables still were laden, the officers of the Salvation Army and Orphanage were gratified by the knowledge that there were 125 perfectly happy children in the building, with not a care in the world, for children live largely in the present.

Captain Holbrook, of the Salvation Army states that it is his hope that the members of the Rotary Club and the Shriners will enjoy their luncheon better in the future in the knowledge that they have contributed so wholeheartedly and efficiently in an effort to give 125 children a cause for true thanksgiving.

In his words "No greater rejoicing can be had than that rejoicing which comes from the knowledge that one has brought joy to others."

THANKSGIVING DAY SERVICE LARGELY ATTENDED IN CITY

A crowd that filled the entire auditorium of the Polk Street Methodist church attended the union Thanksgiving services yesterday morning. The music under the direction of Professor E. F. Myers, was rendered by the choir of the Methodist church, with the assistance of musicians from other churches of the city. The anthem sung were "Sanctus" and "Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem."

The invocation was spoken by Dr. H. W. Virgin of the First Baptist church, and the scripture reading was given by Rev. R. N. McCallum of St. Andrew's Episcopal church. Rev. Roy Rutherford, of the First Christian church delivered the sermon, and the service was closed by the singing of "America."

Cause for Thanks.
Rev. Rutherford stated the trust of this nation in Jesus Christ and its successes as a result of this belief were great cause for giving of thanks. He declared that the teachings of Christ must be incorporated into the party platforms of the political parties of the United States before any continued greatness can be achieved by any faction. He mentioned the fall of Rome, Babylonia, and other politically great centers and said that America will go the same way unless her people add to the teachings of Christ.

The speaker said that America is not great because of the great industries of the country or because of any material achievements, but because of the fact that our ancestors followed the teachings of the Bible, and incorporated them into their laws.

After the sermon, a cash offering was taken for the United Charities of the city. The amount subscribed was \$190.78, and pledges were obtained for future payment amounting to \$46. This amount is a little less than was subscribed last year, when \$200.10 was donated. Last year, however, several large donations were given by individuals, including one amount of \$50, and this year the entire amount was made up from small donations. Others stated that they preferred to make their payments monthly or quarterly throughout the entire year than to subscribe the whole amount at once.

She has not yet finished a survey of all the schools in the county.

UNITED CHARITIES' REPORT FINISHED

CASH BALANCE IS \$111.39, ACCORDING TO SECRETARY R. A. JEFFRIES

A report of the financial condition of the United Charities Association of the city has been made by R. A. Jeffries, secretary, for the year beginning November 21, 1919, and ending November 25, 1920. The report covers all receipts and disbursements during that time.

On November 21, 1919, the association had \$228.44 on hand. To this amount was added a cash offering at Thanksgiving of \$200.10, public subscriptions during the year of \$929.57, and \$1,596.03 from a ball given by Mrs. Herring. This made a total of \$2,854.14 received during the year.

The disbursements were as follows: Groceries and foodstuffs, \$1,170.75; coal and fuel, \$322; clothing and bedding, \$137.05; transportation, \$249.40; tenance of the work, \$48.04. This made tenance of the work, \$48.04. This made the expenditures for the year amount to \$2,157.85, leaving a balance on hand at present of \$111.39.

A subscription of \$190.78 was taken at the Polk Street Methodist church yesterday morning at the union Thanksgiving services. This sum will be turned over to the association for their use during the ensuing year.

MISTRESS MARY FRUIT CUSTARD

1 pint milk
1/4 cup Ralston
1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring
This recipe will make six small custards.
