

WANTS WEEKS KICKED OUT

CULBERSON BESTMAN FOR SENATE SAYS HUDSPETH

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.—Congressman Claude B. Hudspeth of Texas in a letter to R. M. Dudley of El Paso, made public today, announced that he would support Senator Charles A. Culbertson for reelection. Hudspeth is the second Texas Congressman to make public announcement of his stand on the Senatorship, Congressman Garner having also announced that he would support Culbertson.

Hudspeth's letter was as follows: "I am in receipt of your letter in which you make inquiry of me as to the physical condition of Senator Charles A. Culbertson. In reply permit me to state that I visit the Senate chamber almost every day on some matter affecting legislation, and I see Senator Culbertson frequently in his office. I am informed by a reliable newspaper correspondent who carefully compiled his record at the request of a certain newspaper in Texas that was opposing Senator Culbertson, that he has a good record as any man in the Senate.

SMITH-CAPERS STARTS DRILLING AFTER SHUTDOWN

FLOOD LEAVES HEAVY DAMAGE IN ITS WAKE

SLOWLY PUSHES TOWARD GULF AS CITIES AND LANDS SUFFER

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, June 20.—Flood waters of the Rio Grande which yesterday and today wrought havoc at Eagle Pass and Laredo have today reached the Zapata, Texas, district, 150 miles west of here, chasing Mexican farmers and goat herders into the hills on both sides of the river.

Rio Grande City reported that the river had risen 3 1/2 feet, to 20.9 feet above normal, or seven feet under the high mark of Sunday. A slight rise also was reported at Mission. Mexican national lines in Matamoros announced today that operation of trains had been resumed between Monterrey and Ciudad Juarez where a washout occurred Saturday. Ciudad Juarez is 100 miles west of Matamoros. Three trains from a water-borne freight train at Camaguey, reached Matamoros today after having reached the right of way for sixty miles in water from a foot to five feet deep. The entire country is inundated, they said. The actual depth of the river here is 15 feet, and the channel at this point can hold no more water, river men say.

MARCONI NOW HAS A RADIO SEARCHLIGHT

WIRELESS WAVES REFLECTED LIKE LIGHT WAVES, CAN BE SENT IN BEAM

NEW YORK, June 20.—Senator Guglielmo Marconi, wonder man of wireless, tonight announced the invention of what might be termed a radio searchlight by means of which radio waves, which can be reflected like light waves, may be sent in a given direction in a beam instead of being scattered to all points of the compass. The famous Italian said he believed this invention could be utilized in such a manner as to rid the sea of some of its terrors for, with a revolving reflector the transmitter would constitute a radio-light-house capable of flashing guiding beams nearly a hundred miles.

24 INJURED WHEN TRAIN IS WRECKED

LEADVILLE, Colo., June 20.—Twenty-four persons were injured, four seriously, today, when the first section of Denver and Rio Grande Western passenger train No. 2, eastbound, was wrecked at Keebler, a small station, six miles from Leadville. Spreading rails were believed to have caused the accident. The scene of the wreck is at the foot of Tennessee Pass.

SIX TOURISTS ARE KILLED BY TRAIN

MACON, Ga., June 20.—Six tourists bound from Fort Landerfield, Fla., to Nidaleville, Ky., were killed today when a Central of Georgia passenger train crashed into their automobile near Loving Gap, the only one of the party not instantly killed, had officers sent before she died that her husband was Howard Cox, now at Mount Vernon, N. Y. The others were not immediately identified, although efforts in their possession were addressed to Mrs. Cox, Miss Lavonia Taylor, L. A. Taylor and J. P. Taylor.

RAIL MEN NOT STRIKING FOR U. S. CONTROL

CINCINNATI, O., June 20.—Governor Bennett's proposal of the railroads will not be an issue in the threatened strike of one million shop workers and others, spokesmen for the rail unions today told the American Federation of Labor convention which responded to their request by withholding a reaffirmation of the Federation's stand in favor of the adoption of such a plan.

The issue is the amelioration of the wrongs committed by the Railroad Labor Board. Similar pleas by others who are the prospective leaders in the threatened walkout led Max Hayes of Cleveland, to withdraw his motion for a declaration of government ownership money. The question was injected into the convention's work when it for a second time during the day went on record as favoring repeal of the Transportation Act in which connection it denounced the railroad board for its orders, especially those reducing wages and changing working conditions.
