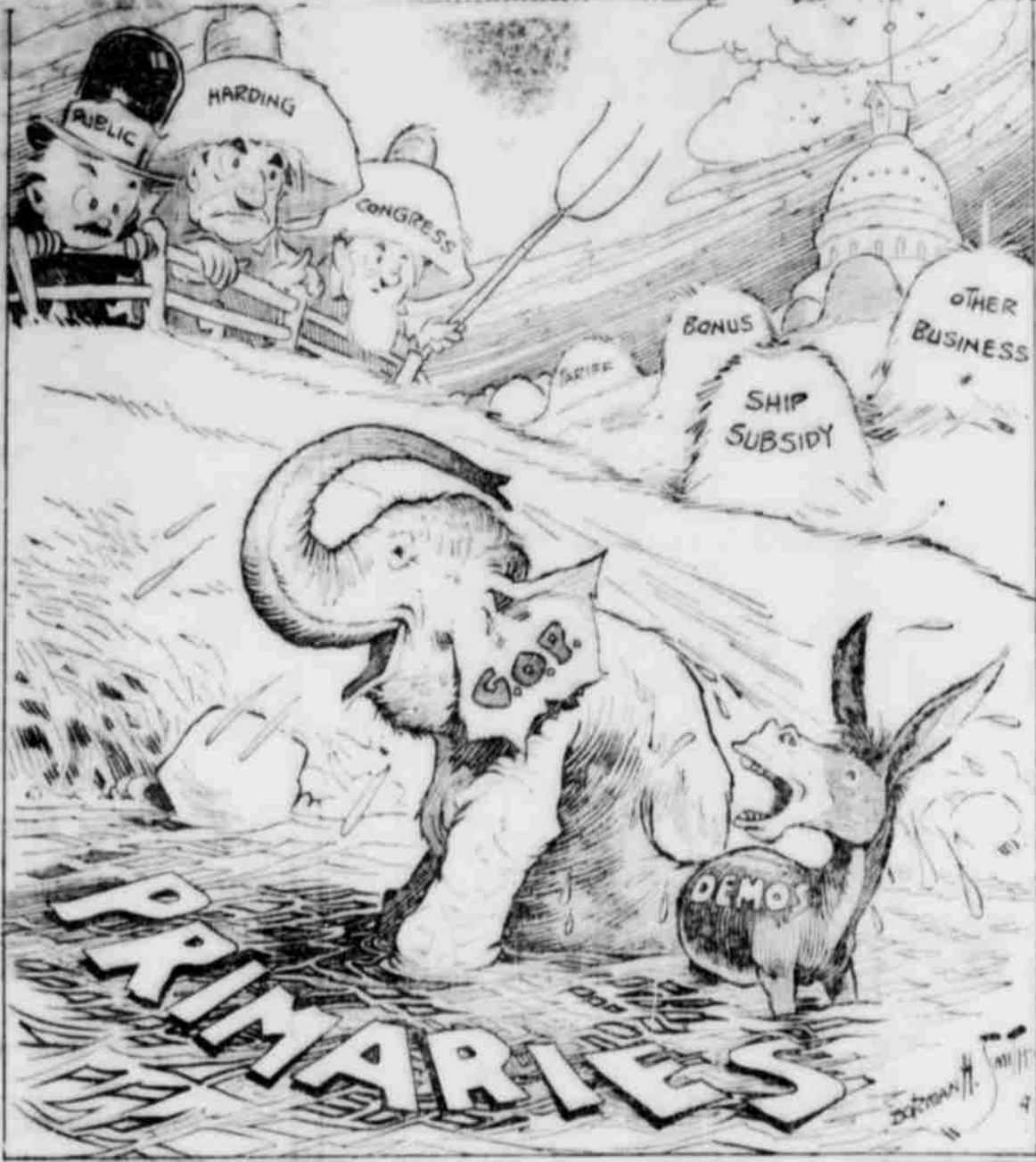


It's Too Hot To Work, Anyway

NEW LOW RECORDS ARE SET BY GRAIN

By Associated Press CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Wheat, corn and oats all established a new low record price for the season today. Wheat was expected to be due primarily to the big yield of corn forecast in the government crop report. The wheat market closed unsettled 1/2 to 1 1/2 net lower, with September \$1.05 to \$1.05 1/2, and December \$1.05 1/2 to \$1.05 3/4. Corn finished 17 1/2 to 1 1/2 down, oats off 1/2 to 3/4. In previous days the outcome was unchanged to the higher. CATTLE AND CALF PRICES ARE WEAKER

By Associated Press SAINT MARYS, Aug. 9.—Cattle and calf receipts for the mid-week session amounted to 5,000 head, and as a result of the liberal holding all kinds had to sell lower. Actual receipts amounted to 3,500 head of cattle and 1,500 calves. Steers, cows and yearlings ruled generally 2 to 3 lower, the loss for the week being close to 75c on steers and 50 to 75 cents on other kinds. Calves caught a downward reaction of 25 to 50 cents. A car of South Texas steers sold at \$8.25 and some yearlings brought \$5.50. An offering of 1,000 head in the hog division cleared on the slow market at prices that were steady with Tuesday's average. Shippers took two cars at \$3.50 and packers purchased one head at the same value. Most of the run cleared at \$2.25 to \$2.50. Quality was good. Pig receipts were small and the market dull, the best stockers going at \$2.00 to \$2.25. Steady prices were paid for sheep and lambs. Only six hundred head were caught. Withers went at \$2.25.

STOCKS IRREGULAR AND LOWER TOWARD CLOSE

By Associated Press NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Opening prices on the New York Stock Exchange today were irregular in relatively light trading but tended downward later on selling of high grade rails, Studebaker, DuPont, and Mexican Petroleum. Insofar as rails were concerned, the government's bumper crop report apparently was offset by publication of statistics showing a decrease in car loadings of excessive freight. Northern Canadian and Union Pacific declined large fractions to one point. Active trading for Peoples Gas lifted it 3/4 points to a new high for the year. DuPont mines and American Steel fortunes also reached peak prices on moderate advances. Mexican Petroleum was off a point, and such products dropped 1/2. DuPont closed a point, while lower losses were registered by Studebaker, Kelly-Springfield, United States Alcohol, Cuban American sugar and Cuban cane sugar preferred. Kroger, with a gain of 2 points, led the specialties, other strong features of which were Burns Brothers A. & T., American Ice Sugar, Freshets and Rollins and American Safety Razor.

COTTON NERVOUS BUT STRONGER AT CLOSE

By Associated Press NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—A further decline in today's early trading was followed by rallies in the cotton market today, but after selling up from 20 1/2 to 20 3/4 for December, prices eased off again, closing at 20 1/8 for that delivery. The nearest market closed steady but one point lower to 19 points higher. Other months were unchanged to 2 points lower, however, and the general market was weak right after the sell, owing to more Liverpool cables, reports of further rains in the Southwest and continued complaints of a poor trade demand.

Hogs: Receipts 2,000, show traders and several packs at \$2.50 steady to 5c higher; showmen not buying; close \$2.50, packers 5 to 10 cents lower; pig \$2.50 to \$3.00, packers top \$2.25, heavy \$2.00 to \$2.50, packers some steady at \$2.00 to \$2.50, pigs steady to 10c lower, \$1.00 to \$1.50. Sheep: Receipts 2,000, lambs generally steady to 25c lower; top natives \$2.25, bulk better grades \$1.75 to \$2.00; sheep steady. Top light ewes \$6.75, most for natives \$-00 to \$0.00.

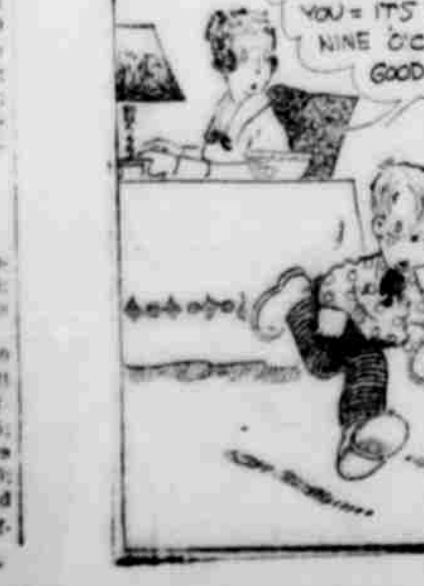
