### PRO TICKET SWEEPS OHIO IN PRIMARY

STANDARD BEARERS OF  
PROGRESSIVEISM AND  
BOOZE, DEFEATED

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 11.—With the news for the gubernatorial and senatorial nominations on both the republican and democratic tickets definitely settled, interest today turned toward the attitude of Ohio voters on prohibition as shown by their ballots in yesterday's primary election.

Returns from approximately four fifths of the precincts of the state gave Carol A. Thompson, administration candidate for the republican nomination for governor and recipient for anti-alcohol league endorsement, a plurality of almost 10,000 votes over the closest of his opponents, among whom were advocates of prohibition and the return of beer and light wines. Congressman C. L. Knight, of Akron, characterized as a Roosevelt progressive, was running second and C. Homer Dugand who made his race on anti-alcohol and anti-prohibition was third. Harvey C. Smith, secretary of state and another liberal candidate was running fourth.

C. C. Crabbe of London, floor leader in the state House of Representatives, and author of various state prohibition enforcement laws and E. E. Case of Trenton were principals in the republican attorney general race, which was recognized as a test of strength of those unfavorable to prohibition in the state. Late returns showed Crabbe in advance by a small lead.

Crabbe is recognized as one of the most prominent dry leaders in Ohio and the anti-alcohol league vigorously urged that he be supported.

Thompson, whose lead in the republican race for the gubernatorial nomination became apparent soon after the returns began coming in, increased his plurality steadily today and tonight had a larger total than the combined votes of the three highest of his eight opponents with 8,685 precincts reported.

222 votes against 2,437 for Hodges. Hearshill Bacon was leading in the fifth Atkinson district and his nearest competitor, by nearly 2,000 votes. The count was: Bacon 8,345; M. E. Dunaway 6,948; A. S. Hyges 2,394 and Mrs. Alice O. Miller 300.

Approximately 60 per cent of the vote in the district has been counted. In the sixth district E. E. Sawyer of Fort Springs had a lead of more than 500 votes over his nearest competitor. His vote, with approximately 50 per cent of the returns from the district, was 7,085; J. H. Reed's total was 6,345, and W. H. Evans trailed with 3,922 votes.

In the fifth district Representative H. M. Jackson and in the sixth, Representative Charles W. Taylor did not seek re-election. In the other districts the nominees were nominated without opposition.

### M'REA'S LEAD OVER TONEY IN ARKANSAS GAINS

MAJORITY OF CONGRESSIONAL INCUMBENTS ARE NOMINATED

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 11.—Governor Thomas C. McRae, nominated as the Democratic gubernatorial standard bearer in the November election—equivalent to election in Arkansas—tonight had piled up a majority of more than 41,000 votes over Judge E. P. Toney of Lake Village, as tabulated by official returns from yesterday's state-wide primary divided in from rural districts.

Returns tabulated tonight gave McRae 75,829 votes and Toney 34,223. Representative Wm. A. Oatfield, was virtually assured of the nomination for reelection to congress from the second Arkansas district.

Oatfield, Democratic whip in the lower house, seeking an eighth term, had
