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OIL PROSPECTS AROUND MADILL, OKLAHOMA, GOOD

WASHINGTON, August 12.—The Geological Survey has just issued a bulletin on the oil and gas possibilities of the Madill-Denison area of Texas and Oklahoma.

Oil seepages near Madill, Marshall County, Okla., led to the discovery and development many years ago of a small oil east of that town. The oil is remarkable for its high grade—about 47.5 Baumé, much lighter than the average crude oil from the pools of Oklahoma—and it is therefore more valuable. The discovery naturally stimulated the search for oil in that region, and companies have therefore made great expenditures in persistently prospecting parts of Marshall and Bryan Counties, Okla., and Fannin and Grayson Counties, Texas. These expenditures have resulted in the discovery of only one small gas pool, known as the Enos field in southern Marshall County, Okla.

Work done by the United States Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, revealed the presence of three distinct anticlinal folds, which they called the Preston anticline, the Madill anticline, and the Leonard-Celeste monoclinal nose. A short description of these features was given in the Survey's Professional Paper 129, published in 1919, but detailed consideration of the conditions that may effect the production of oil had not been completed at the time that paper was published. In a report entitled "The Structure of the Madill-Denison Area, Oklahoma and Texas, with Notes on Oil and Gas Development," by G. B. Hopkins, Sidney A. Hays and H. K. Robinson, recently published as the Survey's Bulletin 736-A, he prospects for oil in the region are considered in detail.

According to this bulletin the formations most likely to yield oil in the Madill-Denison area are the Woodbine and the Trinity sandstones of Cretaceous age. The Trinity is the oil and gas bearing formation of the Madill and Enos pools. However, there is apparently little prospect that very productive wells will be obtained. Gas wells of a maximum daily volume of 5,000,000 cubic feet or oil wells of a maximum initial production of 20 barrels are about the best that may be expected from the Trinity and Woodbine formations of the Preston anticline. Farther south, on the Leonard-Celeste monoclinal nose, oil is found at all, it is not unreasonable to hope for wells of greater yield, but this gently arched plunging anticline does not offer particularly favorable structural conditions for the accumulation of oil or gas.

The possibility that oil or gas may be obtained from the Carboniferous formation below the Cretaceous is indicated by showings obtained in at least two of the deep wells that have been drilled within a few miles of the Madill oil pool. These deep wells, however, in spite of their showings of oil and gas offer little encouragement, for the well records do not indicate that they penetrated sands that would hold much oil. Furthermore, the oil that was found was of extremely light grade, indicating that the forces which produced the deep wells also upon the deep-seated oil-bearing formations, destroying much of the oil or changing it to an intractable residue, and leaving only a remnant of high gravity oil. This destructive action is thought to have been intense in the region southwest of the Madill and Enos fields, and hence a deep test in the area considered would be northwest of the Madill pool, along the anticlinal axis.

HARD TO PREDICT WEATHER A LONG TIME IN ADVANCE

Daily News Washington Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—There have been heavy rains in the East and Middle West recently. There have been days throughout the south when the old palm branches had to be hung up in the closet; there have been days along the Canadian border when the summer tourist concluded he was being cheated—

Yet, Weather Bureau chiefs here say the weather is "normal." "Then they proceeded to prove their claim too. Reporters who hurry over trying to determine this very unusual weather are told to be patient. The records, both figures and descriptive accounts, are consulted. They show that there is nothing unusual. That it is normal to have warm weather throughout the summer, with occasional cold days and rainy spells now and then. But year in and year out the weather runs true to form.

There are just sufficient variations, however, to convince C. F. Martin, chief of all the weather sharks, that it is a poor business to attempt any long distance forecasting. A few days in advance is the most he and his assistants will attempt. Any other sort of prediction, of course he admits after consulting the records that there have been days and periods when the weather actually departed from "normality."

June 5, 1919 was a noteworthy example. There was such a severe frost throughout the northeastern and Ohio states that all farm products were completely destroyed. The frost was so bad that a threshing machine company, just getting started, was forced to bank-ruptly because the anticipated customers were bankrupt themselves. The year 1916 is known as the "year without summer" throughout all New England. The springs of 1907 and 1912 were marked by unusually late killing frosts—but the average late frost is what may be expected when the spring is ushered in early. Weather Bureau reports take all the joy out of life of the weather observer who concludes his section is experiencing unusual weather—and they site the records.
