## 200 STUDENTS ARE REGISTERED AT HIGH SCHOOL

A little more than 200 third and fourth year students have been classified at the High school this week and textbooks have been issued to nearly all of them. Those third and fourth year students who have not received textbooks should come Monday morning for their books and book covers. Students who have not been classified will come according to the following schedule:

Second year students, Monday morning at 8:30.  
First year students, high division, Monday at 1:00 p. m.  
First year students, low division, Tuesday morning at 8:30.

Third and fourth year students who have not been classified Monday at 2 p. m.

It is essential that students come in accordance with the above schedule. No students except those indicated for the different dates should come before Tuesday at 1:00 p. m. when all classes begin. Students not classifying at the time scheduled for them will find it necessary to wait until four o'clock Wednesday afternoon for classification.

State test books will be issued to the students as they are classified. At the same time book covers will be issued to each student. These covers are being furnished free to the students this year and every one will be expected to have his books covered not later than Wednesday morning.

Classification will be completed Tuesday at noon, and all high school classes will meet Tuesday afternoon beginning at one o'clock. All students will assemble in their roll-call rooms which will be assigned to them when they are classified. During the afternoon the complete high school schedule will be gone through in shortened periods. All students who have registered and do not report to these classes will have absences registered against them and will be required to give satisfactory account for their absence. At these first classes lessons will be assigned for regular work on Wednesday. All students will be held accountable for prepared lessons Wednesday. All teachers will be on duty and classes running regularly.

When students come to be classified they must bring their report-cards and text book cards in order to avoid serious delay in classification and in receiving their books. These cards will be taken up and every student will be expected to have examinations for students coming from unaccredited schools will be given Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock.

## PAMPA BUSINESS PEOPLE GETTING READY FOR FAIR

PAMPA, Sept. 9.—The Pampa Fair Association has great prospects of the best Fair this fall to be held Oct. 5 and 6. Several reservations were spoken for some weeks ago and others are being spoken for every day or two. This Fair is open to five counties, Gray, Carson, Donley, Wheeler and Roberts County, all of which can compete for premiums, in fact, no county in the Panhandle will be barred in the live stock department or any contests.

The hog department will be very large this year as well as the cattle department. O. M. Dunkle, the County Agent has the young men and boys of the hog clubs and calf clubs well in hand and the people will wonder at the pride the boys have. Miss Patterson, the demonstration agent who followed M. S. Bass Winters in that work will have her clubs there and their work will be worth seeing.
