of a cathedral. Scientists contend that they are the cause of volcanoes. Inactive volcanoes, however, evidently formed the lava much like the spray of a fountain. The hardening process left no chance for erosion. The rains and the winds have carried the soil into level and unshaping areas, but the volcanic remains. On the very top of the mountain of feet in height, a soft shell has stood for centuries. LaFayette was born here and his cathedral is still standing.

I think Paris is entitled to be called the most beautiful city in Europe. If grass grew in her parks as it does in Berlin and in London, there would be an added charm. The parks in the German and English capitals are much more attractive. The sudden onset of winter there is evidence of the splendor and the artistic triumph of days gone by, but the fountain springs of civilization are drying up.

Will Take Forty Years to Repair Rheims Cathedral.

Cathedral is always of interest. In current history, the one at Rheims continues to take first place. The old cathedral was first made during the fourth century and it will require forty years to repair the destruction of shell and shrapnel.

In making comparison, there are no two cathedrals alike. The one at Rheims is a masterpiece of architectural art. The most wonderful modern edifice is found in Milan. In size and in its contrast with the early days of the Christian religion, St. Peter's at Rome of course takes first place. The art treasures in the Vatican are priceless. In the matter of preserving the traditions, it is the most indubitable evidence of the infancy of Christianity. The Vatican as an institution is entitled to the gratitude of all Christians. This is not the glorification of a Catholic, but of the institution whose three-hundred years of the Protestant faith for centuries.

At America's conception of things is entirely modern. The church might be modern, but the church is going to Rome, to build the "cathedral" of Christ, yet when he gets there he may get the impression that the faith of Christ was in a sense the beginning of the modern period. We look upon a home in America as more or less a copy of it. It is a hundred years old. We were entertained at a country place near Vicksburg. The hostess was very attractive. We inquired whether it was old and the response was "No, not at all. It was built only a hundred and fifty years ago."

On passing through the parts of southern France where you find evidence of Roman occupancy, at Clermont, for instance, which was built four hundred years before Christ, you find an inscription which says "Things were done here when there was a king—Sanguis, Missing On European Continent.

The first line in Europe is not comparable to that in America. On the continent you do not hear the song of the robin, the robin redbreast is missing and if the cardinal is there, I did not see him. The mountains were extremely disappointing in this respect.

Similarly, England, which lies farther to the north, has many nice birds. In France you will find ring-necked pheasants and some small precisely like our own. In the mountains, some pheasant and a partridge which in the middle west is called the Hungarian pheasant. It is about twice the size of a quail. It has been introduced to our country. It does well here, in England.

Which one sees the flowers of America and France, he is apt to know something about the wondrous variety of blossoms in the orient and the tropics, to somebody that there is nothing new, at least in the growth of flowers, under the sun. The old Roman vine is found from the very top of the Alps and all through the Alps, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Germany and Holland.

The French, Germans, Dutch and English are great lovers of flowers. The apple or marble sign is seen everywhere. The dandelion is grown in pots in the southern parts of France and Germany, but after one gets in the presence of the dandelion, he finds it is as hardy as the dandelion. The beauty of the hydrangeas which we Americans have admired so much in its best development in the White mountains, are seen in their best advantage in northern Italy, as one leaves Milan and approaches the lake regions. The hydrangeas, however, does better in Europe than in America.

The average of live stock is much higher in America. Continental Europe for the most part, has only mongrel types of cattle. In America we breed specifically for milk, butter fat or beef. In Europe, food, aside from milk is not considered. The cows must pull the plow and make contribution in milk and butter. Holland, of course, has beautiful herds of Holsteins. The Jersey and Guernsey Islands are yet the land of fine breeding in these types of cattle, but you don't see much of them on the continent.
