## ALL CLASSES CATTLE ARE QUOTED STEADY

**FORT WORTH, Nov. 23**—Brisk trading developed for most classes of cattle Thursday, the market being particularly active. Cattle sold to a moderate extent and values were in line with the recent decline. Some steers sold at \$5.75 and cows in car lots ranged up to \$5.25. Old calves netted \$3.50 for a high range. Receipts amounted to 3,000 head of cattle and 2,000 calves.  
 Sales of hogs were made at prices that were in line with the market of Wednesday but values were fully 10c under the shippers' bids that day. Around 2,000 head were received and the supply was exhausted early. Most of the run sold at \$1.75 to \$2.00. Pigs brought 1 1/2 to 2, the market being about steady.  
 Sheep receipts amounted to 500 head. The market was steady.
