After a four-course luncheon, Mrs. Temple, wife of the Bishop of this Mission district, was introduced by Rev. E. H. J. Andrews, rector of St. Mark's. Mrs. Temple came with a message direct from the forty-seventh triennial convention of the Episcopal church in America, which met in Portland, Ore. in September.

More than 2000 consecrated women attended this meeting which was most wonderful in point of numbers, in amount of business transacted and in the predominant spirit of service and progress.

"Stand behind the church's program" was the message brought home by Mrs. Temple and the other women delegates to the convention.

One of the many interesting points mentioned by Mrs. Temple was the United Thank Offering given by the Episcopal women of the nation, which amounted to \$569,126. Mrs. Temple told in a graphic way of this solemn and wonderful service when the women of the United States rendered unto God in silver and gold their thanks for the blessings He had bestowed upon them.
