Risinger Awarded \$2,500 by Jury in Rail Damage Suit

Trial of the case of D. M. Walsh vs. the Amarillo Gas Company for the death of his son was started in District Court Thursday. The man's death occurred April 15, 1920. The father is asking \$6,000 damages. Neal & Lutonkin represent the plaintiff, while Madden, Trulove, Ryburn & Pipkin represent the defendant.

O. L. Risinger received a jury verdict for \$2,500 Thursday afternoon in a suit against the Fort Worth & DeWitt Rail way. The issue was found principally in favor of the plaintiff, it is said. Risinger asked \$15,000 damages. Barrett & Works represented the plaintiff and Turner & Dooley represented the defendant.

NEWS WANT ADS BRING RESULTS

GRAY COUNTY FARMERS WILL BUILD HUGE NETS TO CATCH RABBITS MENACING CROPS

McLEAN, Dec. 7.—Rabbits have become so numerous and such a menace to the gardens and field crops in this section of the Panhandle that the farmers and business men of the McLean Community Chamber of Commerce have decided to take active stand against them in the form of one big rabbit drive. This will take place Christmas week and will cover a territory of approximately one hundred square miles, the entire south side of Gray County.

Last year it was learned, through cards sent out to the farmers, that damage done by the rabbits to the individual crops in this vicinity ranged from fifteen to three hundred dollars. It is expected that every man, woman and child in the south part of the county will take part in this event. Areas of about four sections will be taken at one time, the rabbits will be driven into huge wings of rabbit wire, which in turn lead to pens where the rabbits will later be killed and sent to the Eastern markets. It is thought that the money made from the sale of the meat will be sufficient to cover the cost of the great amount of wire that is needed for the undertaking.

This is the first work of this kind that has been undertaken here, though for some time the farmers have realized the great amount of damage done to the crops and gardens by the rabbits. It is thought that by means of this drive this immediate section of the Panhandle will be saved thousands of dollars.

Printing Business Has Many Pitfalls

The Art Press: While the printing business ranks fourth in the industries of this country the business is full of uncertainties and pitfalls. In the publishing end you are flooded with catch-penny trade propositions from all over the country, and your local people are continuously asking for free advertising and write-ups which are not news, but simply advertising to help put over some money-making scheme for themselves. No one in the country does so much to build up and develop their city or town as the newspaper publisher and no one gets so little thanks.

Few people realize that space in a newspaper is the stock and trade of the owner the same as the goods on the shelves are to the storekeeper. Strangers can come into the town and get from \$19 to \$25 for space on a three-monthly board, in a hotel register or something of a very little value, but a publisher is a robber if he charges a fair price per inch for his space. He could get that fair price but unfortunately there are many publishers who have to cost system and do not know what the space is worth per inch, and very foolishly make a cut rate.

CHARITIES DRIVE SHOWS TOTAL OF \$1460 FIRST DAY

Six committees, which made partial reports Thursday in the funds raised for the Association's charities, collected a total of \$1,460. There are 21 committees supposed to be working, and, in fact, most of them did collect funds Thursday, but a few committees failed to work, according to C. M. McCullough, general chairman. Mr. McCullough says the persons appointed to solicit funds are expected to cover their territory all over.

Since only six committees reported, it is probable the actual amount collected is considerably in excess of \$1,460. However, responses should be more liberal, Mr. McCullough says. He fears people are not giving as much as they should, and reminds subscribers that the money now being raised is to last through an entire year in caring for the needy.

The drive will be continued today, and all committees are expected to work, and to remind subscribers that enough money must be raised to last a year for relief of the needy.
