B. C. D. WORKING TO GET HELIUM PLANT FOR CITY

Amarillo stands a good chance to get a government helium plant next year, it was indicated at a meeting of the Board of City Development Thursday night.

Secretary Vernon read a telegram from Congressman May's June 28, 1922, in which he stated that he would reply to a letter of the city as soon as he could and from D. Rogers of the Industrial Committee.

M. C. Nobles, representing the United States Zinc Company, appeared before the board and told of a request of the company that \$2,000 be donated by the city for purchase of 42 acres on which a helium plant is to be located. Mr. Nobles said the money was a dead end, whether or not the site was donated. The matter was referred to the City Commission for action on the 15th.

The matter of donating \$100 for the maintenance of the Southwest Trail was referred to the highway members of the Board for action.

John Simpson, president of the Grand Trail Association, made a talk on the trail being done by that organization.

John R. Gillette of the City Commission was instructed by the board to be prepared to submit plans for the all-Panhandle fair to be held here next fall at the next meeting of the board.

M. H. Carver, agricultural agent of the Post Office and Denver Railway, made a talk on the action to establish a West Texas A. & M. College. He said there was no doubt but what such a college would be established. The board members thought that the Panhandle-El Paso Chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers should be organized on the proposition of a hotel.

John E. Myers of the Amarillo Police and Marine made arrangements at the meeting for the new Marine Auditorium next spring.

A committee will be appointed to work with Secretary Vernon to assist Mr. Myers in getting publicity and securing money for the Young Hotel.
