### 395 YEARS SINCE MAGELLAN BEGAN VOYAGE

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Three hundred and ninety-five years ago yesterday Ferdinand Magellan set sail from Spain upon his first voyage around the world. Of the 17 vessels that made up his fleet, only one ship and 18 men were destined to finish the journey. Magellan was to die in a land unknown to Europeans. A hidden rock off the entrance to the strait that now bears the navigator's name sank the first

ship. Mutiny was responsible for the death of three ship-captains and the loss of another ship whose crew suddenly turned tail and fled back toward Spain. On November 28, 1520, Magellan, with three ships remaining, sailed out of the strait and was "the first that ever burst into that silent sea" of the Pacific. Ten thousand miles of uncharted ocean lay between him and his first sight of human beings. Beset with scurvy, putrid drinking water and food infested with worms, they sailed onward "continually ever following the sun toward the West." On March 16, 1521, he sighted the Philippines. Converting a tribe to Christianity, Magellan turned crusader and accompanied his converts to war against a neighboring tribe. The battle was disastrous, Magellan lost his life. The converted natives turned on the Spaniards, massacred 600 of them and drove the remainder of them to sea. One of their vessels, until by order sea service, was burned, another sprang a leak, and a surviving ship, manned by 18 sailors, with Sebastian del Cano as captain set sail for distant Spain. Almost three years to a day from the sailing of Magellan upon the first circumnavigation of the globe, the vessel with only 18 men surviving sailed into the mouth of the Guadalquivir, in Spain.

Today a voyage around the world is a matter of only as many months as the first circumnavigator required years. The whole complexion of

ocean traffic has been changed. Not only has steam increased the speed of ships, but the ingenuity of man has lessened the actual steamship distance around the globe by at least a fourth. Two mighty engineering feats, the Panama and the Suez canals, have accomplished this. If a modern trans-Atlantic liner, some of which are capable of more than 500 miles a day, set sail from Marseilles's starting point in Spain upon a voyage around the earth, and was able to maintain its highest speed throughout the journey, it would arrive back in port in less than two months of the day of sailing. The Panama canal would not only eliminate the journey around South America but the cold danger of a trip around Cape Horn. Likewise the Suez canal removes the necessity of following the course around Africa and offers a safe, swift and comfortable voyage under tropical skies. The two canals have reduced the world-voyage by at least 8,000 miles, making the total length of the journey little more than 22,000 miles, according to the estimate of the U. S. Hydrographic Bureau. Magellan's ships would appear like pygmies beside the modern ocean liners—all could be placed on a single deck of the largest steamer. Their crews of 250 men would scarcely be enough to make the gang of stokers that shovel coal into the boilers of some of the modern ships. The largest ship afloat today has a total crew of more than 1,000 men.
