DEMOCRATS FAVOR RETROACTIVE TAX TO FINANCE BONUS

BILL WILL BE INTRODUCED IN HOUSE TODAY PROVIDING SUCH COLLECTION

WILL FIGHT SALES PLAN

Battle Between Two Factions Will Hinge On Proposed Conflicting Schemes Now Before Members.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, April 26.—A retroactive tax on net profits has been definitely agreed upon by the House Democrats and Treasury Republicans to raise funds for soldier relief legislation. It is expected that the bill will be introduced in the House today.

Under the bill to be introduced tomorrow, an eight per cent tax will be levied on individual and corporate incomes, with the exception of \$20,000 for individuals and \$100,000 for corporations.

ALLIES PLEASED WITH LATE WORK OF WAR COUNCIL

SAN REMO SESSION ENDS—EACH NATION SATISFIED WITH RESULTS

By Associated Press. SAN REMO, April 26.—The results of the supreme council ten days meeting are such that each government taking part seems to consider its aspirations have been amply satisfied.

The premier and foreign ministers parted in great personal cordiality and apparently with much more confidence in the near future.

France gains. The Belgian foreign minister remarked today, "French hopes may be reduced, but her realities will be increased" by the fixing of a sum for Germany to 195.

M. Jasper, the Belgian minister of reconstruction, says that if such a sum is agreed upon the Germans will start earnestly because heretofore there has been no inducement for them to pay any part of unknown and vaguely economic liabilities.

The word "revision" is wholly uncheered by the prime ministers in talking of the treaty of Versailles; the word "interposition" is coming into use. The Italian premier, Signor Nitti, appears to be common over the council leaving the Adriatic question to a continuance of direct negotiations with the Jug-Slavs.

Belgians Satisfied. The Belgians are a united people who believe the western powers—Great Britain, France and Belgium—remain as solid as ever against Germany. The Belgians also are for the "interposition" of the allies.

The attitude of the council was conciliatory toward Russia in protecting the executive or recalled permanent committee of the supreme economic council to negotiate with the Soviet representatives, Kerenski for commerce and Trotsky for industry.

Dark Week For Tanks. The tanks alone may feel that this has been a dark week for them, yet China, which it had been expected would take, has been left to Turkey. But the French statement declared upon taking no further commitments at the war end, except to assist and then give more money and more tanks. The tanks also still have a chance to receive attention through the arbitration of President Wilson in the matter of the Anatolian boundaries.
