NEW FREIGHT RULES RECEIVED BY PALMER

New rules adopted by the Interstate Commerce Commission April 26, relative to freight payments in shipping, have been received by Hamilton Palmer who has charge of the traffic department of the Panhandle Plains Chamber of Commerce. A late law passed by the United States congress makes freight charges payable in cash only. Under this provision, bills cannot be placed in care of docks and be paid at the end of the month.

The rules for the enforcement of the new statute conform to the cash payment feature, but holds that payment on the day following delivery of freight may be considered as cash.
