ELABORATE Discussion of the Silver Amendment

SENATOR COCKRELL DELIVERS A LONG AND FORCIBLE SPEECH IN ITS SUPPORT.

IN SILVER OR GOLD THE BONDS OF THE GOVERNMENT CAN BE PAID.

The Senator Declared the International Monetary Conference a Degrading Proposition.

Washington, March 12.—There was a brief flurry over U.S. as soon as the journal had been read in the senate today.

Mr. Lodge of Massachusetts stated that Mr. Sherman had made an inadvertent error in saying yesterday that he (Lodge) had seen Secretary Olney and had secured from him private papers and information as to Cuba.

Mr. Cockrell was then recognized for a speech in support of the silver amendment to the tariff bill, which he made in an absence since the senate adjourned to adopt Mr. Sherman's motion to suspend Mr. Cockrell's motion to suspend it.

Mr. Cockrell called attention to the balance in the treasury, including over \$122,000,000 in gold and silver, over \$20,000,000 in bonds, and over \$100,000,000 in silver bullion.

Mr. Cockrell stated that the limit of gold as money and referred to a resolution passed by the senate on March 10, 1896, which was a voluntary assumption on the part of the secretary of the treasury.

Mr. Cockrell stated that he should like to see the gold standard in New York declared that \$100,000,000 had been lost in consequence. The senator declared that the Democratic party could not be divided by the silver question.

All proceedings in the house at the night session, which was to have been devoted under the rules to the consideration of private pension bills, were unexpectedly blocked by Mr. Edmund (Gony) of Pennsylvania, who made the point of no quorum at the very outset.

Mr. Powers (Rep.) of Vermont managed to get the floor and made a humorous speech about the contest for the Republican presidential nomination.

The name of the speaker was sprung so suddenly that his supporters were taken by surprise and made a demonstration, but at the name of McKinley Mr. Dillard of Ohio started a round of applause all over the house.

Mr. Dillard suggested such a session and Mr. Wolcott added in decisive tones that the explanation just given planned the senate in a most unusual dilemma.

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LINES Fixed by the Sanitary Commission

DECLARED IN FULL FORCE BY GOVERNOR CULBERTSON IN A PROCLAMATION.

AFFECT QUARANTINE REGULATIONS PROVIDED AT RECENT COMMISSION MEETING.

Are Now in Effect—The Adapted Lines Traced and the Sections Interested Named.

Austin, Tex., March 12.—(Special.) Governor Culbertson today gave out the following proclamation: Whereas, The Sanitary Live Stock Commission, created by the act of March 1, 1895, recommended the adoption of the following regulations:

Now, therefore, I, C. A. Culbertson, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby declare that the said regulations shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of this proclamation.

The Official Reports Will Swell the Number of Killed to Over 12,000 and Many Wounded.

Rome, March 12.—Orders have been sent from the war office to Massawa that the report of General Baldisseri and Baratieri on the defeat of the Italians at Adowa is to be supplemented by the forwarding to this city of a number of important witnesses of the engagement. It was at first proposed to court-martial General Baratieri at Massawa.

Every fresh advice from Africa only tends to confirm the most alarming reports as to the extent of the disaster which has not been made public it is admitted that over 12,000 men were killed, and a large number of the Abyssinians were almost as great.
