Round 8. Gibbons assumes aggressive. He reaches Daly's chest with a left and then repeats on Daly's ear. Daly rushed to plant two left straight on Gibbons' breast and jaw, then jabbed in the neck.

Round 9. Daly opened with a rush, but Gibbons stopped him with an upper-cut. Gibbons jabbed with his left in the neck. Daly lands left on Austin's chin again.

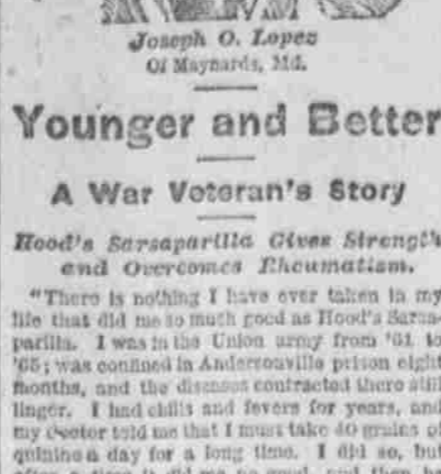
