The czar has ordered the grand duke to be removed from the command of the army and has appointed another officer to the command.

The Dreibund Treaties.

April 8.—The Vienna correspondent of the Times says that the reports of the Dreibund treaties, which were signed for a five year period, on the defensive basis, without territorial gains and the compact will be very shortly.

German Activity.

REPUBLICAN LOVE FEAST.

BY THE REPUBLICAN CLUB OF MASSACHUSETTS.

A Dinner, With Covers Laid For Eight Hundred and Ten Guests—Secretary Tracy Talks.

BOSTON, Mass., April 8.—The largest political gathering of the kind held in Boston for years, the first dinner of the Republican Club of Massachusetts, was held in Music Hall this evening. Covers were laid for 810. Besides the guests and speakers, and with the spectators in the gallery, more than a thousand people were present.

Secretary Tracy, who presided at the dinner, said in his address, which will be delivered by those distinguished men whose names are well known to the people of this country, and whose long and honorable careers have been marked by the highest achievements of the public service.

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
