ALL EYES ARE TURNED TO SPAIN.

Watching to See What She
Will Do About Bringing
on Peace.

SOME OF THE
DEMANDS MADE.

Cuban Independence Not Mentioned.
Only Asks Spain to Relinquish
Her Control There.

IT IS DIFFERENT
AS TO PORTO RICO.

The United States Says That Island
Must Be Ceded Unconditionally,
With All Adjoining Span-
ish Territory.

Washington, Aug. 2.—All eyes are turned toward Madrid, for it is realized that upon the Spanish cabinet depends the restoration of peace. Any question that may have arisen as to the powers of the French ambassador was set at rest by a short, guarded and concise statement issued from the embassy itself. There was much speculation as to the nature of the change made at the instance of M. Cambon in the list of American demands. It was contended in some quarters that no change had been made; in others that an important modification had developed. As a matter of fact, as to the importance of this change, there is a difference of opinion between the parties, the administration looking upon it as consequential while M. Cambon attaches importance to it.

However, as the administration believes that the change is not essential and that it certainly does not affect the principle of the document it might be well to recapitulate briefly just what the demands of the United States were. As to Cuba, it is demanded that Spain is to release her government, possession and control. It will be noticed that nothing is said of Cuban independence and that the acceptance of this position leaves the United States free to deal with the island as it may deem best.

Porto Rico, with the small islands adjacent and embraced within her jurisdiction is to be ceded unconditionally to the United States.

One of the Ladrone islands likewise is to be ceded to the United States as a coaling station.

These three conditions being granted by Spain are to be taken as part payment in lieu of the full indemnity. What further payment shall be required is to be determined by a commission having authority to act for the president, subject to his approval.

Whether Spain shall retain possession of the Philippines as a whole or in part is left to that commission to decide. The reason for deferring the decision as to the future of the islands in this fashion is because the administration is not yet satisfied itself, it is not clear at this moment what sound policy should dictate in the matter.

Meanwhile, and until the commission has satisfactorily disposed of the future of the islands, the United States is to exercise a military government over Manila harbor and bay. The commission will be actually a peace commission and will prepare the treaty which will terminate formally the war with Spain. However, a suspension of hostilities may be declared when the Spanish government shall definitely accept the conditions above laid down and renounce its authority over Cuba and Porto Rico.

President McKinley will call an extra session of both houses of congress as soon as Spain accepts the terms of peace offered by the United States.

It has always been understood that the senate would be convened as soon as the treaty of peace was ready to be acted upon by that body. The attention of the president has been called, however, to a situation which makes the assembling of the entire congress necessary.

Under the law which provides for the raising of the volunteer army, that army goes out of existence as soon as the war ceases. When this law was framed it was not for a moment supposed that after the war had ended there would be any necessity of keeping the army intact. The developments of the war make it very evident that instead of sending the army back to civil life fully 100,000 will be needed. It is the present intention to distribute no less than 50,000 soldiers throughout Cuba, 30,000 in the Philippines and probably 20,000 in Porto Rico. Consequently the aid of congress will be needed to frame

new laws which will keep an adequate army for garrison purposes.

In addition laws must be passed to meet the new requirements of government in the Philippines and Porto Rico.

Working on the Terms of Peace.

Madrid, Aug. 2.—The cabinet council for many hours discussed the peace terms. A dispatch was then sent to Washington for "further explanation of some difficult points."

When the replies are received the cabinet will reassemble.

Senor Sagasta, the premier, confirms the report that some "modifications of the original terms have been obtained."

Nicaragua Canal Will Be Built.

Washington, Aug. 2.—Ex-Senator Warner Miller, president of the Nicaragua canal commission, and Senator Morgan of Alabama had a short conference on the Nicaragua canal question with President McKinley. The president, it is said, expressed his acquiescence in the belief that the government possession of the Nicaragua canal is now necessary, and that the war and its results make the canal indispensable to the United States.

Hobson Sees His Mother.

Atlanta, Aug. 2.—Lieutenant Richmond Hobson is with his mother at Lithia Springs. The meeting between mother and son was a pathetic one. The son kissed his mother, who threw her arms around his neck and for several moments rested her head on his shoulder shedding tears of joy. The lieutenant will return to Washington tomorrow.

Urges Troops to Be Moved.

Washington, Aug. 2.—Surgeon General Sorenberg of the army has recommended to Secretary Alger that the troops now at Camp Alger, Va., be removed to some other location more healthy than that they now occupy. The increasing number of typhoid fever cases is the reason assigned.

I., Aug. 2.—Colonel Hullings with 10 companies of the Sixteenth Pennsylvania, has occupied Juan Diaz, about eight miles north-east of Ponce on the road to San Juan. The American flag was raised and greeted with great enthusiasm by the populace.

Hawaii Settles With Japan.

Omaha, Aug. 2.—It is reported here that Hawaii has agreed to pay Japan \$20,000 sterling in settlement of the dispute which arose out of the explosion of Japanese immigrants from the Hawaiian islands.

Frank T. Arm, paymaster of the navy, with rank of lieutenant.

James W. G. Walker, civil engineer of the navy, with rank of lieutenant, junior grade.
Will Neville Garton, assistant surgeon of the navy, with rank of ensign.

Almost Lynched by Soldiers.

Atlanta, Aug. 2.—A serious riot was narrowly averted at Fort McPherson yesterday, and but for the prompt arrival of the corporal of the guard and a squad of men, together with the assistance of Marshal Ryan of Oakland, one man would in all probability have been lynched by an infuriated mob of soldiers. A fight took place between a negro by the name of Harmon McGinnis and one of the negro soldiers stationed at the post, in which the latter was dangerously, if not fatally injured. After the cutting the crowd of negro soldiers made for McGinnis, who would have been lynched had not others arrested the negro.

A SERIOUS WRECK.

Two Men Killed and Several Hurt, Some Very Seriously.

Atlanta, Aug. 2.—A frightful wreck in which two men were killed and four or five injured, occurred on the Central railroad at Fort McPherson yesterday.

A train bearing soldiers bound for the camp at Lithia Springs, was run into by a freight train. Both engines and trains were badly wrecked, cars being piled one upon another. Bodies were torn in parts, and hands, arms and legs were found lying about.

The dead:
Danev Vaughan, a fireman, taken from under wrecked engine, dead and badly mutilated.
