## TEXAS DEMOCRATS AT GALVESTON.

The State Convention Is Now  
In Full Sway In the  
Island City.

THE COMMITTEE  
ON PLATFORM.

Bailey's Anti-Imperialism Resolution  
Will Be Reported Adversely.  
Bailey Will Make a Fight.

NO FRICTION YET  
IN THE CONVENTION.

The Reports of the Committees on  
Credentials and Permanent Organi-  
zation Adopted Without Any  
Change Whatever.

Galveston, Aug. 3.—The Democratic  
state convention went into permanent  
organization at 10 o'clock this morning,  
adopting the reports of the credentials  
and permanent organization committees  
without change.

The platform committee not ready to  
report, and after considerable miscol-  
laneous speech making, adjourned to 3  
p. m.

The committee on platform will re-  
port adversely to Bailey's anti-imperial-  
ism resolution and he will make a mi-  
nority report and defend it with an elab-  
orate speech. Discussion is likely to be  
lengthy.

Galveston, Aug. 2.—It was consider-  
ably after 11 o'clock when the conven-  
tion had been called to order, several ef-  
forts having been made to get the al-  
ternates to herd in their own corral and  
vacate that which had been set aside for  
the delegates.

Chairman Blake pounded for order and  
then introduced Rev. W. D. Bradford,  
pastor of St. John's Methodist church,  
who invoked divine blessings.

Chairman Blake then introduced  
County Judge Morgan M. Mann of  
Galveston county, to make the address of  
welcome, which was responded to by H.  
M. Hall of Vernon.

Chairman Blake then addressed the  
convention at some length.

At the conclusion of his address the  
chairman had Secretary Kennedy read  
the report of the executive committee,  
recommending the following temporary  
officers of the convention: Chairman,  
Hon. James B. Wells of Cameron county;  
secretary, Hon. A. F. Briggance of  
Grimes county; assistant secretaries,  
C. W. Childress of Tarrant county; Lee  
Blanchette of Jefferson county, Tom  
Napier of Wood county and James Hays  
Quarles of McLennan county.

Hon. James K. P. Gillespie of Har-  
rison county moved the adoption of the  
report, and the motion prevailed with-  
out dissent.

Chairman Blake appointed as a com-  
mittee to escort Mr. Wells to the plat-  
form the Hon. R. M. Stafford, Judge  
Eugene Williams and Congressman S.  
W. T. Lanham.

Mr. Wells made a brief, but enthusi-  
astic speech accepting the chair, and re-  
ceived much applause.

Mr. Fields of Hill county moved that  
the committee on credentials, on perman-  
ent organization and on platform be  
appointed, said committees to consist of  
one member from each senatorial dis-  
trict. Unanimously adopted.

Congressman R. L. Henry of McLen-  
nan county offered the following resolu-  
tion and it was sent to the platform to  
be read:

"Resolved, that the present war with  
Spain was declared for securing the  
freedom and independence of the Cuban  
patriots, and we hereby indorse the  
congress of the United States for inter-  
vening in behalf of those struggling peo-  
ple. We assert that the United States  
did not embark in this war for the  
purpose of conquest and territorial ex-  
pansion, and we oppose it being waged  
for any such purpose. We declare it to  
be the policy of the Democratic party  
and of this government to oppose col-  
onial possessions by the United States,  
and at variance with the theory of im-  
perial aggrandizement.

"Our government is based upon the  
doctrine of a republic composed of sov-  
ereign states, extending rights of rep-  
resentation and taxation to all citizens.  
We are utterly opposed to this govern-  
ment acquiring territorial possessions in  
the eastern hemisphere and becoming  
involved in European controversies in  
that part of the world."

A storm of disapproval greeted the  
reading and the secretary was not per-  
mitted to finish it.

Some one made a move to refer to the  
platform committee and some to table  
it, but Chairman Wells settled the mat-  
ter by declaring it out of order.

A motion for a recess of fifteen min-  
utes brought out a chorus of "noes." It  
took a long time to get the names of the  
men selected for the various committees.

While the names were being gathered  
Wharton Bates of Brazoria county en-  
tered a protest against the list given for  
the Seventeenth senatorial district. He  
explained that when the meeting of the  
Seventeenth senatorial district was held  
John Lovejoy, the member of the state  
executive committee from the district  
presided. There was a tie vote between  
the Guy Mitchell and Wharton Bates  
factions, and Mr. Lovejoy cast the decid-  
ing vote. The right of Mr. Lovejoy to  
vote was questioned because he was a  
contesting delegate.

There was much discussion over this,  
and it was settled by allowing each half  
a vote.

The committee on organization then  
made its report. It recommended  
Frank Andrews of Harris for perman-  
ent chairman.

Congressman Henry renewed his reso-  
lutions and they were sent to the plat-  
form committee.

This wound up the first day's session.

**Prize Ticket In Nebraska.**

Lincoln, Aug. 3.—The fusion state  
conventions, after a continuous session  
Tuesday night, reached an agreement  
on the head of the ticket. The follow-  
ing are the nominees:

W. A. Poynter, Populist, governor.  
E. A. Gilbert, silver Republican, lieut-  
enant governor.

John F. Cornell, Populist, auditor.

W. P. Porter, Populist, secretary of  
state.

C. J. Smyth, Democrat, attorney  
general.

Jacob Wolfe, Populist, commissioner  
public lands and buildings.

W. R. Jackson, Populist, superintend-  
ent public instruction.

All except Poynter and Cornell are  
present incumbents.

**Democrats Successful.**

Montgomery, Ala., Aug. 3.—Returns  
are only lacking to show the Democratic  
majority over the Populists. The legisla-  
ture will be overwhelmingly Demo-  
cratic.

RECEIVED WITH  
MUCH CHEERING.

Hundreds of Porto Ricans Greet  
the Arrival of Garretson's Brigade  
at Port Ponce.

Porto, Aug. 1, via St. Thomas, Aug.  
3.—Porto Ricans lined the steamers by  
hundreds and filled the air with cheer-  
ing on the arrival of Garretson's brigade  
from Yaco. The arrival of the troops  
and those on the St. Louis makes the  
fighting strength of the Americans op-  
erating near Ponce about 9000 men,  
equal to the entire force of Spanish regu-  
lar troops on the island.

There was some firing last night be-  
tween Captain Austin's pickets and  
Spaniards in the bush, but no damage  
was done.

The Dixie's shot at Muro castle on  
last Saturday caused utmost consterna-  
tion at San Juan de Puerto Rico, where  
it was believed to have signified that  
the place would be bombarded within 24  
hours.

**AMERICANS REPULSED.**

A Fight Is Reported to Have Taken  
Place in Matanzas Province.

Havana, Aug. 3.—It is announced  
from the palace that on Saturday morn-  
ing last the plantation of Precioso, in the  
province of Matanzas, was attacked by  
a force of infantry and cavalry under  
the American flag. It is added a squad-  
ron of Spanish cavalry "assisted in re-  
tiring the Americans," who are said to  
have left 10 killed on the field. The  
Spaniards, according to the report, had  
two badly wounded.

In the provinces of Havana and Ma-  
tanzas there have been several unimpor-  
tant skirmishes between Spanish forces  
and bands of insurgents.

The insurgent force under the leader-  
ship of Camejo, opened fire Thursday  
last on San Nicholas, but was seemingly  
repulsed by the garrison, after a short  
period of firing.

Free kitchens have distributed about  
17,000 rations during the last two days.  
It is estimated that about 12,000 per-  
sons are being fed daily from charitable  
sources.

**Punta Mays Attacked.**

Havana, Aug. 3.—The German cruiser  
Geirer has arrived here from Vera Cruz,  
Mexico. French cruiser D'Estaing is  
expected at Sagua la Grande.

French steamer Manoubia, captured  
last Saturday off Isabelle-Sagua, and  
taken to Key West is an American ship.  
Spanish report says on Saturday last  
an American warship fired on Punta  
Mays, Matanzas battery, after the  
battery opened fire on the warship, which  
it is said to have withdrawn for the  
time and returned with another ship.

**Shafter's Men Ordered Home.**

Washington, Aug. 3.—All the troops  
of cavalry with Shafter's army and the  
eight companies of Roosevelt's rough  
riders have been ordered to proceed to  
Montank Point, L. I., for encampment.  
Shafter has been directed to use all  
transport facilities he can command and  
send the troops north as rapidly as pos-  
sible. The regular cavalry with Shaf-  
ter comprises eight companies.

Aug. 1:

Total sick, 4200; total fever cases,  
3179; new cases of fever, 680; cases of  
fever returned to duty, 479; deaths Aug.  
1, 15.
