## SPAIN'S ANSWER AT WASHINGTON.

Officials Say It Is Just What  
Was Expected From the  
Spaniards.

### THE CONTENTS KEPT SECRET.

It Is Said It Contains Counter Prop-  
ositions and Asks For Informa-  
tion on Some Points.

### A CONFERENCE HELD OVER THE DOCUMENT.

The President and the French Amb-  
assador Discuss the Matter, but Sep-  
arate Without Reaching Any  
Conclusion.

Washington, Aug. 4.—After a confer-  
ence on the peace question lasting an  
hour between the president and M. Cam-  
bon, the French ambassador, the latter  
acting as the representative of Spain,  
Secretary Day emerged from the White  
House and announced that yesterday's  
conference was inconclusive, whereof  
the parties to it had agreed not to state  
publicly what had occurred. The secre-  
tary did not appear to be discouraged as  
he made this statement, though he ad-  
mitted that no time had been set for an-  
other conference.

From this it is gathered that the long  
expected answer of the Spanish govern-  
ment to the president's note had turned  
out to be just as it was expected—either  
a counter proposition or a request for a  
fuller statement in detail upon some of  
the clauses of the president's note.

Up to the middle of the afternoon it  
was stated by all parties concerned that  
the Spanish answer had not been re-  
ceived, that the only formal note that  
had come to hand was one from the  
Madrid cabinet to M. Cambon asking  
for information upon some points that  
were not clear to the Spanish minister.  
However, just after 3 o'clock the secre-  
tary of the French embassy, M. Thi-  
bault, called at the state department and  
arranged with Secretary Day for a meet-  
ing between the president and the am-  
bassador at 3:45, as already stated, af-  
ter conferring for an hour the parties  
separated, having been unable to reach  
a conclusion as to the acceptance by  
Spain of peace conditions laid down by  
the president and binding themselves  
to the observance of the strictest secre-  
cy as to the proceedings until further pro-  
gress had been made. Thus it is prac-  
tically assured in advance that any at-  
tempt to state what occurred at the  
meeting at the White House would be  
nothing more than pure guess work.

Washington, Aug. 4.—The govern-  
ment is now waiting to hear again from  
Spain, and this time it is expected the  
answer will be final. The president de-  
clined the earnest appeal of the French  
ambassador to modify the United States'  
demands, except in slight and com-  
paratively unimportant respects. There  
is no doubt but that peace negotiations  
are progressing to the entire satisfaction  
of the president and the members of the  
cabinet. The conference yesterday at  
the White House in which the president,  
M. Cambon and Secretary Day partici-  
pated, was devoted almost entirely to a  
discussion of the details which are re-  
garded by the president as unimportant  
and hence the request of the French am-  
bassador, for the most part, will be ac-  
ceded to. One of these was that the  
commission to be appointed to settle on  
the terms of peace to meet outside of  
the United States, and preferably  
France. The president sees no objection  
to granting this request and it is  
said to be practically settled that the  
conferences will be held at Paris.

The Madrid government, through  
M. Cambon, propounded the questions  
as to the time Spain will be expected to  
evacuate Cuba and the territory ceded  
to the United States and what provision  
will be made by the United States to  
protect the interests of Spain and her  
subjects of these islands while the  
evacuation is in progress. M. Cambon  
was informed upon all these points, pre-  
sumably to his satisfaction.

The one point, however, which the  
Spanish authorities, judging from their  
communication to their representative  
here, failed to comprehend, and Sec-  
retary Day's call upon the ambassador  
was for the purpose of making perfectly  
clear this point, which was that the  
evacuation of Cuba, Porto Rico and one  
of the Ladrone islands, to be selected by  
United States, and the permanent ces-  
sion to this government of all of these  
islands except Cuba, was made a con-  
dition precedent to all peace negotia-  
tions, and that not until these terms had  
been fully complied with would this  
government consent to entertain any  
peace propositions whatever.

### A DISTINGUISHED WOMAN.

Mrs. Ledyard Stevens and Her Work  
in the Paris Exposition.  
Mrs. Ledyard Stevens, president of  
the commission of women who are  
working for a woman's department at  
the Paris exposition of 1900, is one of  
New York's leading spirits among pro-  
gressive women. She is a native of  
South Carolina, and toward the close  
of the civil war was sent as a child to  
her grandmother, Mrs. John W. Chan-  
ler in New York, on a special pass is-  
sued by General Sherman.

family Mrs. Stevens is a line descen-  
dant of John Winthrop, governor of the  
colony of Massachusetts. She is also  
descended from Peter Stuyvesant, the

Home-Made Skin Tonics.  
Greasiness of the skin generally  
arises from lack of cleanliness or de-  
bility of the skin. Only an astringent  
has an effect upon it, and a very sim-  
ple and entirely harmless one may be  
made from one pint of rosewater, half  
a pint of white wine vinegar and a few  
drops of the essence of rose. This  
lotion should be applied with a soft  
linen rag or a fine sponge.

Blackheads are difficult to get rid of  
once they appear. They are caused by  
the clogging of the pores of the skin  
by dust or foreign matter. Alcohol, 99  
per cent, applied by means of a piece  
of chamois skin, will give tone to the  
skin and remove unsuspected dust and  
dirt, at the same time stimulating the  
small glands and removing, by con-  
stant use, the blackheads.

Tan and freckles may be removed by  
the following lotion: Two drachms of  
powdered sal ammoniac, four fluid  
drachms of cologne water, one quart  
of distilled water. As home remedies  
both lemon juice and borax are very  
efficacious for the same purpose.

For some skins which cannot stand  
constant washing, but needing to be  
cleaned after a walk or ride by other  
means than soap and water, salt vir-  
ginal is a delicious preparation, and is  
made as follows: One pint of rose,  
orange-flower or elder-flower water,  
half an ounce of the simple tincture of  
benzoic and ten drops of the tincture  
of myrrh.

After exposure to a harsh or chilling  
wind it is well before retiring to rub  
a quantity of fresh cream on the face,  
removing after five or ten minutes, to  
be again applied, followed by a gener-  
ous puffing of rice powder. Remove in  
the morning by salt virginal and tepid  
water.

### Queen Wilhelmina.

Queen Wilhelmina's well-known dis-  
inclination to provide Holland with a  
prince consort by marrying is said by  
knowing ones in European courts to  
have a tangible practical reason.

The young Queen is now eighteen  
years old and is to be formally crown-  
ed this year and assume control of the  
fat, rich little kingdom so long admin-  
istered by Queen Regent Emma. Not  
having yet tasted the bitter with the  
sweets of power, Wilhelmina is in no  
hurry as yet to contemplate giving up  
the reins of the kingdom.

If she should marry and begin at  
once, in the provident Dutch way, sup-  
plying Holland with heirs of the royal  
house, some of them would doubtless  
be boys. The eldest son of Queen Wil-  
helmina would, upon his eighteenth  
year, succeed her on the throne.

The Dutch law does not contemplate  
the possibility of such a case as that  
of Queen Victoria, who has ruled for  
thirty-five years beyond the legal ma-  
jority of the English Crown Prince. If  
this were the law of Holland possibly  
Wilhelmina would have less objection  
to matrimony.
