A Remarkable Revival.

Rev. S. C. McClung called at the Eagle office yesterday and talked to the editor about the meeting that closed last Sunday at Peach Creek. The Eagle last week published an account of the Fifth Sunday meeting there, and has since had a partial account from our Green's Prairie correspondent of the revival meeting that followed, mentioning the conversion of an old lady, 75 years old.

Rev. McClung and Rev. G. A. Foster assisted Rev. S. C. Martin in this revival.

The meeting resulted in 42 additions to the church—19 by baptism, and the others by letter and reclamation. Mr. McClung says it was the best meeting he ever attended. The extremes of life, and the afflicted met in glorious experience of the grace of God. Mrs. Sims, already mentioned, was 75 years old, and was baptised by the aged minister, Rev. S. C. Martin, himself 74. Little Miss Arnold, 11 years old, was converted and prayed in public, and gave evidence of a very bright conversion. A deaf and dumb man was among the converts. The meeting opened with cold feeling, but as it progressed people became alive to the work of the Spirit, and reserve was thrown aside, and people talked "almost as with unknown tongues." Mr. McClung thinks that Rev. S. C. Martin is a man wonderfully blessed with power for the work of bringing people to Salvation, and says his work on this occasion was marvelous.

On Sunday there was baptism and preaching at the water side, and a glorious dinner was served. A splendid collection was also taken up here, and the meeting closed with a feast of rejoicing and handshaking.
