SECRET UNDERSTANDING.

Wellington Charges Such Exists Between This Country and England.

Washington, May 29.—In the course of a speech in favor of the adoption of a resolution expressing the senate's sympathy for the Beers yesterday, Mr. Wellington of Maryland referred to a secret understanding existing between United States and Great Britain. When Mr. Lodge demanded proof that such an understanding existed, Mr. Wellington said that in the circumstances it was difficult to present tangible proof, but he believed the proof could be found in the secret archives of the state department.

Mr. Lodge replied that under our form of government no such understanding could exist, and as secretary of state had emphatically denied the existence of any alliance or understanding he believed the country would accept his statement as true.

The reading of the sundry civil appropriation bill was completed, but not all of the committee amendments have been disposed of.

A lively debate was precipitated over the proposition to continue the life of the industrial commission until Oct. 31, 1901. Charges were made that the commission was being used as a Republican machine and that important testimony had been suppressed. The committee amendment however, was agreed to.

The house had a dull day considering the near approach of final adjournment. The Alaskan civil government bill was passed and some odds ends of legislation were cleared up. Mr. Dalzell gave notice that the antitrust resolution and bill, reported by the judiciary committee, would be considered Wednesday, Thursday and Friday under a special rule.

Reduction Asked.

Washington, May 29.—The secretary of state has sent to congress the resolutions of the chamber of commerce at San Juan, Puerto Rico, asking congress to reduce the tariff on rice from \$2 per hundred weight to 20 cents per hundred weight until Jan. 1, 1902, and the duty on olive oil from 50 cents to 10 cents per gallon until the same date.

Door Resolution Referred.

Washington, May 29.—The Teller resolution of sympathy with Beers referred to the committee on foreign relations by a vote of 49 to 26.

Bill to Sell Choctaw Lands.

Washington, May 29.—In the senate Mr. Jones of Arkansas reported the house bill authorizing the commissioner general of the land office to dispose of the Choctaw Indian Orphan lands in Mississippi, and it was passed.

Louisiana Purchase Donation.

Washington, May 29.—The senate committee on appropriations agreed to Senator Cockrell's amendment to the civil bill appropriating \$5,000,000 for the Louisiana Purchase exposition in 1903.

Amendment Modified.

Washington, May 29.—The senate agreed to a modified amendment of the sundry civil appropriation bill relating to Chinese immigration which direct the enforcement of exclusion laws should they be under the control of the secretary of the treasury.

Walnut Log for Paris.

Denison, Tex., May 29.—A walnut log 47 inches in diameter, which was cut in the Osage country, is being rafted down the Arkansas river to Tulsa, I. T., where it will be shipped by rail to New York, thence to the Paris exposition. The log struck a sandbar about a mile north of Tulsa bridge, and it will be a difficult task to dislodge it until the next rise in the river. The ferryboat went up to bring the log down, but was unable to get it away.

Negligence is Charged.

Belton, Tex., May 29.—Suit has been instituted in the district court here by Mrs. Elizabeth McCormick et al. vs. B. Lantry Sons, for the alleged negligent killing of her husband on March 2, 1900. Plaintiff alleges that by reason of a defective guy rope, which broke, a large derrick fell and instantly killed Jerry McCormick. She sues for \$35,000 damages. The accident occurred at the rock quarry three miles west of here.

Baby Drank Coaloil.

Granger, Tex., May 29.—While Mrs. John Wade, living on the John Young farm, five miles east of town, was preparing a late dinner for some visitors, her 16-months-old girl got hold of the coaloil can, which they kept in the kitchen for starting a fire. She drank an unknown quantity, from the efforts of which she began to have spasms and died in a few hours.

Texas Lumber for Europe.

Sabine, Tex., May 29.—The bark Siyah cleared for Hamburg with 884,679 feet of pitch pine lumber shipped by the Texas Tram and Lumber company and 22,873 feet of sawn timber shipped by the Sabine Export company, the value of the cargo being \$14,431. There are now in port here four barks and one barkentine, all taking lumber cargoes for foreign points.

Colorado Quarantines.

Denver, May 29.—The state board of health has decided to quarantine against the entrance of Chinese and Japanese into Colorado.

Lost Planet Found.

Denver, May 29.—While watching the eclipse Prof. Howe rediscovered the planet Eros, lost two years ago.

Supreme Court Adjourns.

Washington, May 29.—The United States supreme court has adjourned and will not sit until next October.
