#### TRAIN HELD UP.

Amount the Bandits Secured Is Not Definitely Known.

St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 23.—Four masked men at 10 o'clock Tuesday night held up westbound Burlington and Missouri River train No. 41, five miles north of the city. The safe in the express car was dynamited and the car wrecked. Officials of the road say that the safe contained but little money. Other reports say that it contained from \$5000 to \$10,000 in money. Everything in the safe was taken, and the men escaped in the darkness with horses. Not a shot was fired.

#### STACY CAUGHT.

Made His Escape From the Louisiana Penitentiary Some Weeks Ago.

Gardner, Mass., Sept. 23.—Chief of Police W. P. Allen captured Tom Stacy, who escaped from the Louisiana state prison at Baton Rouge. The man admitted his identity. He had a revolver fully loaded in his belt. He said he would have used it on his captor if he had got a chance. Stacy was sent to the penitentiary on Jan. 15, 1901, on a twelve-year sentence for burglary and larceny. He escaped with two negroes on July 5, and has since been free.

#### RANEY CHOSEN.

He Is to Command For Four Years the Patriarchs Militant.

Baltimore, Sept. 23.—The sovereign grand lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows elected General A. M. Raney of Marengo, I. T., a commanding general of the Patriarchs Militant for a term of four years. General Raney was appointed commander of the military branch of the order last year, and his election was received by the Patriarchs with cheers at the Fifth regiment armory, and General Raney was compelled to make a speech.

#### Shooting at Madill.

Madill, I. T., Sept. 23.—Anderson Davis, colored, came up from his home in Denison and, joined by his nephew, Dave Davis, met Sam Smith. As a result of a quarrel, Sam Smith drew his gun and opened fire on the Davis negroes. He shot Anderson Davis dead and shot Dave Davis in the right leg just below the knee, inflicting a painful wound.
