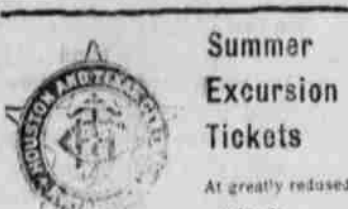

THOMAS TIBBLES TALKS

Accounts For One-Third of the Campaign Fund.

USED FOR SPECIAL ISSUE.

Prominent Populist Says as Soon as Mr. Bryan Returned From Convention of 1904 He Wrote Editorial Headed, "I Shall Support Parker."

Omaha, June 5.—Some light was thrown on the disposition of the now famous \$15,000 campaign fund raised at New York in 1904 and spent in the Nebraska campaign by a statement given out by Thomas H. Tibbles, Populist nominee for vice president in that year.

At that time Mr. Tibbles was editor of the Independent at Lincoln, and Mr. Bryan's Commoner was printed by the Independent plant. Mr. Bryan's editorial desk was in the Independent office.

Mr. Tibbles says: "I know right where \$5,000 of that New York fund went. It went into the special edition of 96,000 copies of the Independent, which was gotten out for the purpose of electing George W. Berge for governor. The entire paper was given up to the candidacy in that edition, of the Independent, Populist and fusion candidate for governor. This amount was handed us by Tom Allen, James C. Dahlman and Colonel John G. Maher, and they secured the funds from the Democratic national committee on a trip which they made to New York.

"I do not know what became of the other \$10,000, but I know positively of the disposition of the \$5,000.

"I also know something about the charge that \$15,000 was sent to Nebraska to get Mr. Bryan to support Parker. The day after Mr. Bryan returned from the St. Louis convention he dropped into the Independent office, sat down at his desk and began writing an editorial. The first words were, 'I shall support Parker.' We put that editorial in type and ran it in the Commoner the following week. All that was done long before there was any talk of needing money in the Nebraska election, and should dispose of the ridiculous talk about Mr. Bryan being paid to support Parker."

MUCH MONEY COLLECTED.

Syndicate of Aims Gatherers Seems to Have Flourished.

Chicago, June 6.—A syndicate of alms gatherers, said to have collected hundreds of thousands of dollars on the plea that the money would be used for the voluntary support and care of feeble old men and women in various cities of the United States, is being investigated by detectives of the Chicago police department.

The woman in charge of the Chicago headquarters said the money was collected to be used in supporting institutions at Grand Island, Neb., Denver, and Shreveport, La. The institutions were said to be called "House of Hope." A telegram from Shreveport declares there is no "House of Hope" within the limits of that city.

REUNION VISITORS.

They and Veterans Are Arriving at Birmingham on Every Train.

Birmingham, June 5.—Veterans and visitors are arriving on every train for the Confederate reunion here next week, and indications now are the attendance will be the largest of any reunion ever held.

General Tyler, of Forrest's cavalry corps, requests that all of the survivors of the command meet with him in a preliminary meeting at Hotel Morris. Survivors of this corps will participate in the big parade next Thursday on horseback.

Decorations of the city already cover several blocks, and 100 men are at work putting up bunting, pictures of generals and small flags.

Walker Wins.

San Diego, Cal., June 5.—The steamer St. Demis, which arrived here from Ensenada, brought in the report that W. F. Walker, the New Britain, Conn., banker, arrested in Lower California, and who was fighting extradition, has won his case in the Mexican courts, and that orders revoking the commitment to the Ensenada prison were expected to reach Ensenada soon. The report is indefinite as to what authority rendered the decision. If he has won in the upper courts he must now await the slow action of Mexican courts before he can be released.

President's African Trip.

Washington, June 5.—President Roosevelt has been giving attention lately to his plans for his trip to British East Africa next summer, on which, it is understood, Kermit, his son, will accompany him. The president will carry a complete hunting outfit and devote much of his time to the study of the habits of animals and collecting of material for a book.

Making Great Preparations.

Victoria, B. C., June 5.—Mail advices from Australia state great preparations are being made to receive the American battleship fleet. There will be a round of banquets, balls, picnics, regattas, cricket and baseball matches. Sydney and Melbourne propose to spend \$250,000 each to entertain the fleet.

Bishop Potter in Bad Health.

New York, June 5.—Bishop Potter is at his home in Cooperstown suffering from a nervous breakdown. It is declared the bishop's indisposition has caused him to abandon his trip to Europe.

CHINAMEN'S LONG TRIP.

Travel From Galveston to Frisco in Box Car.

San Francisco, June 5.—When a sealed box car, which apparently came intact from Galveston, was opened in the Southern Pacific railway yards Friday, sixteen half starved Chinese were found, in addition to a half load of heavy steel. The car was ten days on the road and had been in the yards for forty-eight hours. The Chinese had a little water and a few crackers left, but were weak and hollow eyed. One of them showed a certificate entitling him to admission to this country, but the others were turned over to the immigration officials. It is supposed by officials the men were smuggled across the Mexican boundary and placed in the car at El Paso, the seals of the car being replaced with others.

WAGON BRIDGE GONE.

Splendid Structure at Denison Has Been Swept Away.

Denison, June 5.—The magnificent wagon bridge that connected this section with Oklahoma was swept away Friday morning, not a vestige being left. The rise of the river all Thursday and Thursday night brought down immense drifts that literally pounded the piers to pieces. The structure was 600 feet in length, cost \$60,000, and was built in 1891. Nothing has happened in years that has so much depressed the community, especially business circles. This bridge was the great avenue of trade with Oklahoma. It meant thousands of dollars yearly to our merchants.

All work on the Katy bridge has been suspended. The situation is bad as can be seen. S. B. Fisher, chief engineer of the system, has taken charge of the situation, men are now trying to save the north piers of the railway bridge. The immense drifts are being diverted so they will escape the piers.

The wagon bridge was a total loss; no insurance. It was a stockholders' concern.

A man named Dalton was carried away with the wagon bridge and drowned.

RESTORATION OF SERVICE.

Permission Given Katy by Railroad Commission Over Telephone.

Austin, June 5.—Authority over the long distance phone was granted by the railroad commission to the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway to establish delayed through passenger service into Texas from St. Louis. Through service had to be abandoned on account of the washing away of the Red river bridge north of Denison. This detour is to be made via Paris. Trains from the north will come as far as Durant, Okla., thence to Huga and then over the tracks of the Texas and Pacific to Paris, thence to Denison. This will delay through service several hours, as the detour to be made is approximately 200 miles.

Candallia Contract Entered Into.

Austin, June 5.—The governor, attorney general and land commissioner on behalf of the state entered into a contract with Walter Willett, of San Antonio, whereby the state sells to Willett the Candallia plant growing on all unsold public free school lands situated in Brewster and Terrell counties for a period of five years. The consideration is \$1,000, payable at \$200 a year. Willett is said to have discovered this plant or shrub and intends to manufacture it into paraffine wax. This contract made in accordance with the gayule act of the Thirtieth legislature.

Depart For Panama.

Fort Worth, June 5.—Two girls, Cecil Allen, aged sixteen, and her sister, Fay, aged eleven, accompanied by their grandmother, Mrs. Mary Allen, aged eighty, left for Panama, via New Orleans, where they will make their future home. The girls' father, J. C. Allen, formerly resided at Cleburne, and now is one of the canal superintendents.

Sight May Be Restored.

Washington, June 5.—Thomas Gore, the blind senator from Oklahoma, who is undergoing treatment at the Episcopal hospital here, firmly believes, it is said, his sight will be restored. In the event of any improvement through the treatment a slight operation will probably be performed. The treatment supplies nourishment to the retina of the left eye, which is separated from the optic nerve.

Temporary Offices Opened.

Paris, Tex., June 5.—General Manager Nixon, Superintendent Cehluyer and Office Manager Levy of the Frisco have opened temporary offices here until the Frisco situation on the Red river division is relieved. Ten engines and crews arrived from the Red river division.

Charged With Shooting.

Amarillo, Tex., June 5.—Jack Freeze, quartermaster of Troop B., was arrested here charged with shooting Elgin Warren Friday morning on a downtown street.

An army gun was used. Warren may recover.

Not Regarded as Serious.

New York, June 5.—There was no change Friday in the condition of Senator Bailey, who is here preparing for an operation to relieve an affection of his throat. The senator said he does not regard his condition as at all serious.

Damage Tremendous.

Wichita Falls, Tex., June 5.—Flood damage here and in vicinity is estimated at \$300,000. Farmers are the greatest sufferers. The Denver is detouring over the Katy between here and Henrietta.
