BACK FROM DALLAS.

Mr. A. W. Buchanan Tells of the Great Hardware and Implement Dealers Association.

Messrs. J. Allen Myers and A. W. Buchanan returned last night from the meeting of the Retail Hardware, Implement and Vehicle Dealers Association in Dallas. Both were highly impressed with the importance of the meeting and the great good that may come out of it for the people of Texas.

In discussing the meeting with Mr. Buchanan yesterday, he said: "It was the most interesting and valuable meeting I ever attended." Among the multitudinous questions discussed, the paramount issue was "Freight rates in Texas."

Railroad Commissioner O. B. Colquitt was present and addressed the meeting, explaining in detail the authority and the operation of the commission. He showed many instances wherein the commission was powerless to act because their rulings were in conflict with the rulings of the Interstate Commerce Commission. He stated as a positive fact, that by a coalition of certain steamship lines and the railroads of the state, that water, rate competition to the sea ports of Texas had been destroyed.

Mr. Colquitt stated if he were governor, he would subsidize a steamship line between New York and some Texas port and build a railroad from the Red river to connect with said port.

It was very conclusively shown that Texas was imposed upon more in freight rates than any other state in the Union.

Mr. Buchanan thinks if the whole people could be aroused as are the retail dealers, something would be done.

A resolution was introduced by Messrs. Buchanan and Myers pledging the co-operation of the Association to the Farmers' Union in their effort to secure a greater consumption of low grade cotton by its manufacture into cotton bagging, cotton rope etc. The resolution was passed without a dissenting voice.

The meeting was one of the most important ever held by a body of business men in Texas, and portends great good to the state.

The meeting adjourned at 6 p. m. Thursday afternoon.

Weather Notes.

Galveston, January 21.—The northwestern disturbance noted yesterday has disappeared beyond the limits of observation, and another disturbance of considerable energy is moving in over the north Pacific coast. It has been attended by general rains in Pacific districts and in middle and northern Plateau. Light local rains have occurred in east Gulf states. Elsewhere has been generally fair. The temperature has fallen moderately over the eastern slope of the Rocky mountains and in west Texas, and has risen in all other districts. The weather in Texas has been fair, and the temperature at time of report ranged from 36 degrees at Armarillo to 68 degrees at Brownsville. Over the eastern half of the State it is well into the sixties. The weather in this vicinity will be generally fair and continued warm tonight and Friday, with light to moderate southerly winds.
