REPORT MUST BE FULL

The President Does Not Want Any Synopsis of It.

CAN BE STILL INVESTIGATED

The Secretary of the Navy Can Instruct the Court to Further Pursue Their Work If They Deem Such a Necessity.

Washington, March 18.—The president does not now expect anything in the nature of a preliminary report from the court of inquiry into the cause of the Maine disaster. On the contrary, his expectation is the report which, when it comes, will be complete in all respects, although following the usual course it is within the power of the secretary of the navy to order the body to continue investigation along certain lines should he believe further information desirable.

No official notice of the stoppage of Spanish torpedo boat flotilla at Canary island, and their turning back from that point has reached our government as yet, so that any assumption that movements of the flotilla influenced the navy department to withdraw the fleet at Key West is said to be without basis of fact.

The navy department, by no means, has suspended its efforts to obtain possession of desirable warships abroad, and in no direction is there visible any relaxation of the steadily pursued purpose of the navy and war departments to provide for the defense of this country against a hostile attack. The formation of a new squadron at Hampton Roads is in itself only the latest manifestation of activity in this direction, being the outcome of deliberations of the strategy board, which has been sitting almost daily at the navy department for some time past.

Another conclusion which the board desired to put in force as soon as possible is that the navy must be reinforced by a number of torpedo destroyers, not torpedoes.

WORST HE EVER SAW.

Senator Gallinger Tells of His Trip Down in Cuba.

Washington, March 18.—Senator Gallinger was at the capital today for the first time since his return from Cuba. When requested to make a statement as to his observation of the state of affairs on that island, he responded:

"You can sign my name to any picture you may draw of the utter wretchedness, destitution and hellishness of this country. The conditions of affairs, so far as I had opportunity to observe, as I was only in Havana and Matanzas, is simply indescribable. I had not expected to find it half so bad as it is, and I do not believe anyone who simply reads accounts, and does not see for himself, can form an adequate idea of the situation.

"The best information obtainable leads to the conclusion that there has been, beyond the 400,000 deaths as the result of the yellow fever, and the tragedy of Spain's ruin, the Society goes on from day to day."

"With reference to the military aspect of affairs in Cuba, I saw nothing that impressed me with the idea that Spain knows much about modern warfare."

DISCUSSED THE SITUATION.

Senator Sagasta Gives Details of the Trouble Over Cuba.

New York, March 18.—A special to The Herald from Madrid says:

In the presence of the queen regent Senor Sagasta gave a full recitation of the situation between Spain and the United States. It was the occasion of the weekly council of ministers at the palace.

The Epoca says: "In the midst of so much agitation it is satisfactory to say that the relations between the United States and Spain have entered on more tranquil phases."

Captain General Blanco telegraphs a highly optimistic view of affairs in Cuba.

It is significant that Senor Sobral, the naval attaché at Washington, who has full powers of all the United States coast defenses, has been appointed on the staff of the admiralty and had a long conference with the minister of state.

The Stock Exchange takes a gloomy view of the situation.

The publication of official returns showing that the receipts of the Cuban customs for February are more than double the same month last year is regarded here as throwing cold water on Senator Proctor to President McKinley that the general conditions in Cuba are growing worse.

PLAYING FOR EFFECT.

Blanco Intimates Austria Has Formed an Alliance With Spain.

New York, March 18.—A dispatch to The Herald from Havana says:

It is the evident intention of General Blanco to make it appear that an alliance has been formed between Austria and Spain. With or without the sanction of his government, the Austrian consul, Frederick Berner, is lending himself to this idea.

Washington, March 18.—Nothing of special importance developed at today's cabinet meeting beyond the fact that the report of the Maine court of inquiry is not expected before the early part of next week.

Stars and Stripes Hoisted. Gravesend, Eng., March 18.—The cruiser Amazonas, built by the Armstrong's and purchased by the United States, was formally transferred from the Brazilian flag to the stars and stripes this morning.

Afloat in South England. Madrid, March 18.—The Imparcial says: "The instructions sent to the torpedo fleet to remain in Canary islands are to the government's desire that the squadron should be escorted to Cuba by a cruiser and for no other reason."

Chili Still Holds the Ottigagos. Yalparaiso, March 18.—Patricio Lortun Alcaide, minister of war and navy, says: "You can emphatically deny the story of the sale of the Chilean cruiser O'Higgins or any other warship to Spain."

Big Order For Powder. Santa Cruz, Cal., March 18.—The California powderworks have received orders from the navy department for 3,200,000 pounds of brown prismatic powder. This and previous orders for smokeless powder will keep the works running to their full capacity for one year.

Italy Did Sell to Spain. Madrid, March 18.—According to a dispatch received by The Imparcial from Rome, the Italian minister of marine confirms the reported sale of the armored cruiser Varese to Spain.

Farmer's Terrible Mishap. Alton, Ill., March 18.—George Crawford, an old and esteemed farmer, living near Upper Alton, was accidentally killed. Crawford was riding on a wagon load of oats, and while coming down the hill to the Upper Alton station of the Burlington, the brake on the wagon broke. Crawford was thrown to the ground and the heavily loaded wagon passed over him. The horses went to the foot of the hill, where they took fright at a passing train and started back up the hill. Strange to say, they went directly to where Crawford was lying in the road, and the wagon again passed over his body. He lived about 20 minutes and died in great agony from the numerous injuries received.

Charged With Betbery. Lincoln, Neb., March 18.—Mayor Frank A. Graham and Harvey B. Vail, a former city excise man, were arrested by Sheriff Trompen on warrants sworn out by the county attorney, following indictments returned by the grand jury. The charge against each of the men is bribery. The indictments are the direct result of the investigation of the council a month ago, which resulted in the impeachment of Mayor Graham, now proceeding. Mayor Graham and Mr. Vail were taken before District Judge Holmes and gave bail for their appearance at the next term of court. The action of the grand jury came as a surprise, it being supposed that no criminal action would be started until the impeachment trial was concluded.

Rich Farmer Dies Suddenly. Terre Haute, Ind., March 18.—John J. Farrell, the richest man in the county whose wealth was solely acquired from agriculture, fell dead while talking to a neighbor. He had no near relatives and his fortune of \$100,000 will go to nieces and nephews at Indianapolis.

Craft Hotel Damaged by Fire. Hannibal, Mo., March 18.—The Craft hotel was damaged by fire to the extent of \$1000. The fire is supposed to have originated from the furnace. The guests became greatly excited, and several of them used the fire escapes.

Killed by Chloroform. Gilmer, Tex., March 18.—Mrs. Smith, wife of a sawmill man at the end of the tram railway, was suffering with headache on Thursday and placed a handkerchief saturated with chloroform over her face. When found she was dead.

Texas Farmers Planting Cotton. San Diego, Tex., March 18.—Farmers of Duval county have begun planting cotton. This is some three weeks before the usual season, even for this section.

Washed, Ind., March 18.—Mrs. Silas Bunn, a young married woman of Huntington, swallowed 10 morphine pills. She was found by a neighbor, and the doctors think they can save her. She said she was weary of life.

To Be Addressed by Justice Brewer. Iowa City, Ia., March 18.—Justice David J. Brewer, of the United States supreme court, will deliver the annual address at the commencement of the law department of the State University of the state of Iowa, June 8.

City Marshal Leonard was shot and killed almost instantly by a negro whom he had arrested for burglary. The murderer, whose name is not known, stole a horse from L. E. Eger, two miles south of here, and escaped. A telephone message from Lathrop, received here, states that the horse had been found in a pasture near there, and that it was thought the negro was washing in the woods near by. An armed and mounted posse left in the forenoon, and if the murderer is captured he will undoubtedly be lynched.
