PASTORATE ENDS NEXT SUNDAY.

Rev. Challenger Will Leave Bryan Early Next Week.

It will be remembered that some few weeks ago Rev. Challenger tendered his resignation to his church board as pastor of the Christian church and same was accepted. After its acceptance Rev. Challenger accepted a call to the pastorate of the church at Windsor, Mo.

Later the church here decided to have the whole matter re-considered and retain Rev. Challenger as pastor if possible. Accordingly the official board appointed a committee to communicate with Rev. Challenger in regard to the wishes of the church, and the following is a copy of the letter they addressed to him:

Rev. James A. Challenger, Bryan, Texas.

Dear Brother Challenger:— We the committee appointed by the official board of the First Christian church of Bryan, Texas, and acting for the congregation of said church, respectfully ask that you reconsider your resignation as pastor of this church, and earnestly request that you ask the Christian church of Windsor, Mo., to release you from your contract with them.

During your pastorate here you have so endeared yourself to this congregation and to the religious people generally, that we feel that it would be a calamity for you to leave us at this time, especially in view of the fact that mainly through your efforts we have recently erected a church edifice that would do credit to any denomination of a town much larger than Bryan, on which there is a debt quite large for a congregation so small as this. We feel also that just at this time, more than ever we need your earnest leadership and help in the payment of this debt and for the continued upbuilding of the Christian faith in this town and community.

We further believe that the Windsor, Mo., congregation will, when they thoroughly understand the situation here, readily release you and we earnestly pray that they will.

The pastor's association of the city also addressed a letter to Rev. Challenger earnestly requesting that he reconsider his resignation, which was signed by Dr. M. E. Weaver, Dr. T. H. Morris, Dr. F. P. E. Duffy and Rev. T. A. Searey.

Rev. Challenger accordingly communicated with the church at Windsor, but they refused to release him in the following telegram:

This settled the matter and next Sunday will be Rev. Challenger's last Sunday in Bryan. He will leave early next week to visit relatives at Taylor and Georgetown, and from there he will go to Windsor and enter upon his pastoral duties about March 15th.

W. A. Stacy Dead.

Mr. W. A. Stacy died Sunday morning at 3 o'clock at his home in Houston at the advanced age of 70 years.

Mr. Stacy was a gallant ex-Confederate soldier, having served throughout the war as a member of the 4th Texas Regiment, Hood's Brigade. He leaves a widow and three sons, W. P., W., and J. H. Stacy, all living in Houston, and one daughter, Miss Treva Stacy. The remains were shipped to Navasota and laid to rest there yesterday. He was a brother of Messrs. Pete and John Stacy of this city, and Mr. John Stacy went to Navasota to attend the funeral.

W. L. Houston to Hearne.

Mr. W. L. Houston has resigned his position with W. J. Coulter and accepted a position with the dry goods house of Davison & Smith of Hearne. He left at noon yesterday to enter upon his new duties. Mr. Houston had worked for Mr. Coulter for eight years, and for Eugene Edge two and one-half years. He is a splendid dry goods man, and courteous and obliging salesman. During his residence here he has made many friends in Bryan and the surrounding country who regret to see him leave. He will not move his family to Hearne until after the close of school.
