At a banquet in honor of Edgar Allan Poe in London last Monday night Sir Conan Doyle said that if each of the story-writers who have drawn inspiration from Poe would contribute a tithe of their indebtedness to the building of a monument it would be large enough to dwarf the pyramids.

Agricultural Commissioner Kone has asked the attorney general to undertake an investigation for the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a cotton oil mill and ginners trust in Texas. It is claimed that such an organization has been formed for the purpose of controlling the price of cotton seed.

San Francisco is now reaping the harvest of the seeds sown by Dennis Kearney, the sand lot orator, and his associates a quarter of a century ago. It is as true of cities and states as of individuals that "whatsoever a man soweth that also shall he reap."

In an article published last Friday, Monsieur Laubet, ex-president of France, argues strongly that the world is approaching rapidly the era of universal peace. He says that public opinion in all nations condemns war and that it is being crystallized into an irresistible force.

That canard about Mr. Bryan being a candidate for president the fourth time is on a par with the story started some time ago that he was about to enter the ministry and the canard of last week that he would join go on the stage as star actor in a play which he would himself write.

It appears that Lieutenant Governor Davidson was too previous in his announcement at Dallas that the Governor would be satisfied if the legislature would pass the general appropriation bill and go home. Gov. Campbell insists that the platform demands shall be acted on and threatens to call an extra session if they are ignored. Somehow the solons seem to shy at the "demands" but they must choose, it seems, between them and the grindstone.

There is no serious objection to the legislators, en masse, visiting different parts of the state; indeed there are good reasons for believing that the time spent in such jaunts is better employed than the average of that employed in the legislative sessions in the capitol. These excursions tend to relieve the members of local prejudices and to broaden their views. It would be well if they could be extended to include all parts of the state, especially those parts about which the average member knows very little, such as the Panhandle and the Trans-Pecos regions.

Since it is generally admitted that legislative excursions are not a bad thing within certain limits, why not systematize them so as to secure the best possible results? Let each house upon organization appoint a committee on excursions with authority to arrange a program for the session. A special train could be chartered for the term and kept in readiness, which, in order to avoid the suspicion of railroad influence, should be provided at the expense of the State. Only members and employes of the two houses should be admitted, all dead-ends being cut out to save expense but more especially to guard the unwary and unsophisticated legislator from the wiles of the seductively gay and wickedly cunning lobbyist. The more we think about it the more we see the impossibility of condensing into a paragraph all the advantages of this plan.
