NEW BUILDING FOR A. AND M.

Board will let Contract at Meeting in Dallas on March 29th.

College Station, Texas, March 5.—The Board of Directors of A. and M. College will meet in Dallas March 29th, for the purpose of opening bids on a new building which is to house the administrator offices of the Texas Experiment Station and the State Feed inspection system. The plans were drawn by F. E. Geisecke, College architect.

The building will be located about eighty feet east of the present Agricultural building. It will be a basement and two stories, 60x115 feet in size.

In the basement will be store rooms for feed samples, preparation rooms for feed samples to be tested; rooms for general supplies and mailing rooms for bulletins and tags.

The first floor will be the offices of the director of the Texas Experiment Station, his assistant, State feed inspector, laboratory, offices and collection room for the State entomologist and the Experiment Station library.

The second floor will be given up to the State chemist.

The entrance to the building will be through a neat dark porch passing to a tiled vestibule which leads to a stair hall. To the left is the office of the director of the Texas Experiment Station, 19x21 feet in size. East of the entrance, which is to the right, will be the office of the assistant director. Stenographer's rooms are joining each of these. The stair hall leads into a corridor that runs east and west. At the west end of the corridor are apartments for the State entomologist and at the east are apartments for the State feed inspector department. Back of the corridor in the center of the building will be the Experiment Station library, 23x38 feet in size.

The building will be fire proof. The foundation and walls up to the first floor will be concrete, reinforced. Above the basement, all outside walls will be brick, finished with cement wearing surface. The interior will be supported by a steel frame. The roof will be a flat, reinforced concrete slab, covered with tar and gravel. All stairs will be reinforced concrete, except the stair leading to the roof where there will be government instruments of the weather surface, which will be iron. It will be a steam heated building, from the central plant. The general design has been kept plain. Where ornamentation is used it will be of classic design of artificial stone. No wood work or galvanized iron will be used in decoration.

B. V. P. U. LYCEUM COURSE.

Second on March 26th, by Prof. J. F. Beckwith of Baylor University of Waco, on the subject, "Oratory." Prof. Beckwith is professor of oratory in the University and is a graceful and fine orator.

Third on April 9th, by Dr. B. F. Riley of Dallas, on "The Holy City." Dr. Riley is one of the greatest men before an audience in Texas. Dr. Riley was for years Professor of English and Belleslettres in the University of Georgia, one of the greatest schools of the South for finish and polish. He was also a delegate to the Worlds Congress of Religion at Jerusalem, and from personal knowledge will bring us a story of the deepest interest to all.

Fourth on April 23rd, by Dr. C. A. Ridley, pastor of the First Baptist church of Beaumont, subject, "The Longest Poll Gets the Persimmon." Dr. Ridley is one of the very brightest young men in the State and is sure to captivate his audience.

The course is put on at an exceedingly low price, considering its great merit, and will be a treat that none can afford to miss. Aside from its merit, your patronage will help a worthy cause.

CONTRACT AWARDED.

Perkins Building Goes to Contractor C. E. Jenkins of Bryan.

The bids for the erection of the Perkins building were opened at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the office of the City National Bank. Mr. C. E. Jenkins of this city was the lowest bidder and was awarded the contract.

The competition was sharp and six firms were represented in the bidding as follows: J. S. Harrison, Waco; Fell & Ainsworth, Waco; J. R. Hartgraves, Caldwell; Johnson & Buest, Beaumont; H. T. Lewis, Bryan; C. E. Jenkins, Bryan. The price at which the contract was let is private. Mr. Jenkins will begin work just as soon as the material can be gotten on the ground, and it is to be completed by August 1st.

The front is to be finished in Elgin Manganese facing brick, and the brick for the body of the building is also to come from Elgin. The whole to be furnished by the Texas Fire Brick Company.

The building has already been described in detail in these columns. It is to be two stories, the whole lower floor of the corner building to be occupied by the First National Bank, and the inside building by B. Kaczer & Co. The second story will contain offices exclusively.

The Eagle is glad the contract went to a Bryan man, for it guarantees work for our home people and the pay roll and contractors money will all be kept at home.
