DEATH AT RAYMONDVILLE.
 Young Man from Chicago Victim of Typhoid.

The community of Raymondville was saddened Saturday night by the death of Arthur Masters, who had been there a short time on a visit to his uncle, James LaGro. Mr. Masters had come from Chicago to visit his uncle, who is the owner of a large orange grove near Raymondville. He was taken ill several weeks ago, and his malady soon developed into typhoid fever. As he grew worse, his mother Mrs. Theresa Masters of Chicago, was summoned to attend him, and she arrived before his death. Arthur Masters was aged 19 years. He was a bright young man and had won the liking of all who had met him during his short stay at Raymondville. His untimely death caused universal regret here.
