DOORS SHUT ON J. W. GATES.

Claridge's Hotel in London Says He Is an Undesirable Guest.—His Profanity Was Objected To.

London, Sept. 13.—Claridge's hotel, the home of European and Oriental royalty, of British aristocracy and American millionaires, has barred its doors of its palatial establishment in Brock street against John W. Gates.

In the summer of 1900, when plunging on the English race courses, Gates' habits were of such a character as to induce the management of Claridge's to enter him on its permanent list of undesirables. Upon his arrival in London this week, Mr. Gates found that he could not engage his former extensive suits of apartments in Claridge's and was compelled to take rooms at the most hospitable and less particular Carlton hotel, in Pall Mall.

Speaking to the correspondent the manager of Claridge's said: "A week ago some one showed us an editorial in a Chicago newspaper describing Mr. Gates as the most vulgar of American millionaires. The writer must have overheard the remark in our hotel, for that was the name he earned for himself here. After a few month's experience of his style of living we were compelled to intimate to him that profane language and reckless expectation in an English hotel frequented by well-bred people was intolerable, even in a man to write checks of eight figures and lose a fortune daily in stocks, horses and cards.

"Gates' presence was really more objectionable to his countrymen than to anyone else. Several Americans declared an unwillingness to stay under the same roof with him and we frequently told our European patrons not to judge American men of wealth by Gates' standard, as they were disposed to do.

"Gates' whole fortune could not procure him a night's lodging at the hotel.

DEFECTIVE SIGHT IN CHILDREN.

The handicap of imperfect vision naturally interferes with the progress of the child in his studies, says Dr. Grace Peckham Murray, in an article in the October "Delineator" on backward children. A well-known oculist of New York states that defective vision is a very common cause of apparent mental dullness in young children. A child's eyes should be examined when he is old enough to attend school, in order to be sure that he does not suffer from lack of good eyesight. One writer has said that he never met with a case of chronic bad spelling that he did not also find some visual defect. It must be remembered that trouble from imperfect seeing comes not only from seeing words and figures wrongly but also from fatigue of the brain caused by eye strain.

TEXAS TO THE FRONT.

Texas Medical Journal.
Dr. Worsham's paper in this issue, descriptive of the splendid asylum for epileptics now being constructed at Abilene under his supervision and nearing completion, will be read with great interest. In addition to the \$200,000 appropriated for the purpose by the bill originally, the last legislature gave \$50,000 more, making a clean quarter million dollars for this splendid charity. Thus Texas sets the pace. This is far in excess of any appropriation made by any State for its epileptics. This act alone should make Governor Sayers' administration famous; but this is not all he has done for the unfortunate of Texas. By his advice, such appropriations were made by the legislature as to enable the State to double the capacity of its three lunatic asylums, and introduce all modern improvements for the safety, comfort and care of the inmates, and today it is the proud boast of Texas that there is not an insane patient in any jail in Texas; they are all provided for by the State, in comfort, and under the best management. Appropriations for enlarging the asylums were made under the two administrations preceding that of Governor Sayers, but Culberson and Hogg promptly vetoed them—"cut them out." All honor to Governor Sayers.

NEELY FILES SUIT.

Wants Back Money Taken from Him When Arrested in Cuba.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 13.—Information has been received at the War Department that C. F. W. Neely has instituted proceedings in New York to recover the \$6,000 which was found upon him at the time of his arrest in Cuba. This money was in the possession of the Postoffice Department, but when Neely was tried it was turned over to the War Department as one of the exhibits in the case. It was sent to Cuba and returned to the United States and now is at the War Department. It is understood that the Cuban Government has given an intimation that the money should be turned over to its treasury, but the pardon of Neely raises the interesting question whether that Government has not forfeited all claim against Neely or the money found in his possession.

IDOL OF SPANISH PEOPLE.

King Alfonso Is Winning the Esteem of His Subjects.

Madrid, September 13.—King Alfonso has won golden opinions from many of his subjects, though the members of the ancient aristocracy look askance at a monarch who puts aside so many of the traditions of the proud throne of Castile and Leon. Alfonso, however, is but a boy and his little pleasantries need not be taken seriously. Much that is exaggerated has been said about him, and his enemies, though having no reason to hate the king, personally, deliberately do all in their power to bring the monarchy into discredit to further their own ends. It must not be forgotten that not only the Carlists, staunch Catholics and claimants of the throne of Spain, are interested in representing the youthful sovereign as despising sacred things, but that also the republicans and socialists, who have increased greatly of late years, are anxious to set the people against him. Alfonso, however, has many good qualities, and as he grows older should grow in favor. It may be questioned, however, if he has a strong enough hand to rule his turbulent kingdom.

Alfonso dislikes being guarded, and the people are glad to see that he trust them. In the course of his journey through the provinces the women loved him with praise. "Look, how handsome and how sweet he is."

"Long live his gracious majesty," shouted two handsome girls at Gijof the other day.

"Thanks, my beauties," cried Alfonso; "you are too amiable."

In Covadonga, while ascending the steep hill to the sanctuary, where tradition insists that the Spanish sovereign must be consecrated a canon of the church, the king was anointed, and bounding up the ascent left ministers and generals behind. A village lad who had followed him, finding it difficult to mount, took hold of the king's stick to pull himself up. "Hold on tight," exclaimed Alfonso, laughing.

These stories are told to the king's credit, and show that he is popular among the common people. Speaking to a child at a factory who had presented him with a bouquet of flowers, Alfonso said, putting his hand ruefully into his pocket: "Although I am king, my pockets are empty. Pardon me and come to my lodgings." The lad went away contented and greatly pleased the king by saying: "Till we see each other again, Mr. King!"

Alfonso's friends declare that he will make one of the best monarchs Spain has ever known.—Houston Post.
