**Letter to Wm. J. Russell.**  
Brownsville, Texas.  
Dear Sir: The Trustees of Fair Ground, Cobleskill, N. Y. were glad to pay 15 cents a gallon more for Devoc; and no wonder. Two other paint agents said it would take 150 gallons of their paint to cover the buildings.  
Our agent put at 125 or less. It took 115.  
We saved them 35 gallons of paint and painting (worth \$4 to \$5 a gallon, as the painting costs two or three times as much as the paint) less 15 cents a gallon on 115 gallons. Say \$140.  
That's how to count the cost of paint. The costs of putting it on is \$3 or \$4 a gallon. You see what that means. Go by Devoc.

He has several acres in milo maze which he planted on the 10th day of April and cut on the 5th of July, producing a yield of 35 or 40 bushels per acre. Mr. Wier brought several of those heads to town and they are pronounced fine by all who have seen them. With a yield of 35 or 40 bushels of grain to the acre in less than three months, this country ought to, if for nothing else, be the greatest hog and poultry country in the south. However, hogs and poultry are not all that can be made to grow and fatten on milo maze; it is equal to corn for working stock.—Kingsville Times.
