On the first day of the Jewish month of Tishri, which fell this year on Saturday, Sept. 10, began a period of ten days which for Judaism has ever been and remains to this day the most solemn and momentous occasion of the entire religious year.

Tishri begins not the first but the seventh month of the year. It should be borne in mind, however, that the day which is now known as the new year, was originally called either the day of Judgment or the day of Memorial, and received its present appellation as the result of circumstances in which the general reader is not particularly interested.
One fact is brought out in Jewish history that it is well to note, and that is the reverence with which the Jews held the number seven. The seventh day became the Jewish Sabbath, the seventh year was the Sabbath year, and after seven Sabbath years came the great year of Jubilee.

The beginning of each month of the year, was observed with religious ceremonies as the day of the new moon and as the Israelites held specially sacred the seventh day, year, etc. of the seven new moon lunations, one of the two most sacred and solemn holidays in the Jewish calendar.
The second fact regarding this holiday, that makes it peculiar, is the fact that it is not observed to commemorate any event in the life of a great individual or even an event in the national history of the nation, as is the case in most religious holidays. It stands for an abstract religious principle. It is made a day of religious examination on the part of the Jews, and calls upon all Jews to repent and seek forgiveness for their evil deeds. This call is made by the blowing of the "Shofar" or rams horn, which has been modernized into the cornet. It is a call that never fails to awaken the most solemn echoes in the hearts of all Jews who have not entirely drifted away from their ancestral faith.

In every corner of the globe, even in India, China and the Isles of the sea, wherever fate has brought together a handful of the scattered of Israel, the first day of Tishri, and by some the second day, is observed with solemn prayer. Jewish work-stops and houses of business are generally closed from sundown of the day before to sundown of that day.
In the United States over 1,000,000 Jews, half of whom reside in the city of New York. The other half million are widely scattered in every town and hamlet of this land. In many places the small number of Jews makes it impossible to maintain a synagogue organization throughout the year, but during the fall holiday season a synagogue is formed and placed in charge of some competent person. The upper grade students of the Hebrew Union college at Cincinnati, Ohio, and of the Jewish theological seminary in New York city officiate each year in many such communities.

The Jewish calendar which is a moon calendar so runs that Sept. 10, in the Roman calendar, will fall on a different date next year, and each succeeding year.
