OKLAHOMA GRAND JURY STILL WORKING

First Case Not Made Public—Gov. Haskell Now Under Fire.

 Tulsa, Okla., May 22.—The Federal grand jury that is investigating the Muskogee townsite frauds, is still pegging away and resumed the taking of testimony at 9 o'clock this morning. The cases now being looked into are Gov. Haskell's, Turner's and Eaton's. The investigation of one case has been completed, but the jury is keeping secret its findings. If any indictment was found, the fact has not been announced to the public. From present indications it would seem that the entire investigation will be completed before any finding are given out. J. C. Wilkinson of St. Louis, was the first witness called this morning.

PROHIBITION FIGHT ON IN SMITH

Junk Dealers Swear to Multitude of Empty Bottles tho' County is Dry.

 Tyler, Texas, May 22.—The prohibition fight is on in dead earnest in Smith county and promises to become red hot. The ants have brought the junk dealers into the fight and their affidavits have been taken to show that half a million empty bottles have been gathered up in Smith county within the past three years. This testimony is offered to show that much wet goods are being disposed of notwithstanding the fact the county is dry. The ants are claiming that prohibition is responsible for all crime and intoxication. Both sides have just fired their first guns.

FOSTERS WEATHER BULLETIN

Washington, D. C. May 22.—Last bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross continent 22 to 26, warm wave 21 to 25, cool wave 24 to 28. The principal feature of this disturbance was expected to be a great rise in temperature and dry weather. Next disturbance will reach Pacific coast about 26, cross Pacific slope by close of 27, great central valleys 28 to 29, eastern states 31. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about 26, great central valleys 28, eastern states 29. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about 29, great central valleys 31, eastern states June 2.
 This disturbance will cause very big temperatures and drought and following the storm center a great fall in temperatures will occur with thunderstorms and rains. All weather features will be radical and severe storms in a few limited localities are probable.
 Next bulletin will give general crop weather forecasts of June, one of the most important crop months of the year. I am expecting a number of destructive storms during that month and will give readers of these bulletins the best advice possible.
The Comet is Coming.
 Much curiosity and excitement will be caused next year by the return of Halley's comet, the largest and most spectacular that ever visited our solar system during historic time. Astronomers cannot tell us the exact day the comet will cross the earth's orbit and therefore cannot determine whether any danger threatens. It is not wholly impossible for a comet to greatly injure the earth and less impossible that it might come so close to the earth that animal and human health would be impaired. The chances, however, are immensely against any danger next year from Halley's comet.
 Probabilities are that we will see in this comet the finest display and the most wonderful ever witnessed by many people now living. This comet returns every 75 years and those who might remember its last visit must now be at least 80 years old.
 Astronomers are not sure as to its form during the coming appearance as it has frequently changed its appearance. It is the first comet definitely recorded in history, it having caused great alarm more than 2000 years ago. More anon about this wonderful comet.
