A PROPOSITION.

The Eagle has from the first been opposed to the doctrine that a servant of the people has a right to accept employment or favors from a public service corporation or trust whose interests are antagonistic to the interests of the people. Moreover, the political editor of The Eagle believes that protectionism in any shape, form or fashion is inconsistent with one of the fundamental principles of Democracy. With these convictions it is impossible for The Eagle to support Senator Bailey in his contentions; on the contrary, to oppose him is a patriotic duty.

But the editor of this department sincerely desires to be fair to those who disagree with him. With this object he proposed to our associate, Mr. A. J. Buchanan, a Bailey man, that each of the two editors of The Eagle should discuss his side of the questions at issue over his own initials, becoming thereby personally responsible for what was said.

Mr. Buchanan declined on the ground that his time is so fully occupied by his duties as local editor that he would be at a disadvantage, which is true.

The offer made to Mr. Buchanan is hereby extended to any partisan of Senator Bailey, provided that the discussion must be limited to principles and policies and that offensive personalities must be excluded. "Come and let us reason together."

There are Bailey men who are not open to conviction but will accept without question whatever their idol says. There are Bryan men equally unreasonable in their devotion to their leader. But the great majority of Texas Democrats belong to neither of these classes and will exercise the glorious American privilege of thinking and acting for themselves. Such of these as believe in the principle

of protection will doubtless sustain Senator Bailey in his contention, while all who oppose protectionism in every shape, form or fashion will side with Bryan.

Yesterday at Fort Worth, the executive committee of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association elected the A. and M. college an honorary member of the association. This action is not simply a graceful compliment to A. and M.; it gives the livestock department of the college all the privileges of the largest organization of cattle raisers in the world and fully commits the association to the support of the college.

In the redland districts of East Texas wheat growing is to be one of the forms of diversification. A roller mill is to be built on condition that the farmers guarantee the acreage. In Panola county, 300 acres have already been prepared for seeding. Texas is now "be thrid in wheat production and in a few years will be first among the states. The redlands of Brazos county would grow good wheat.
