CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Will Offer City Hall Lots for Sale. Salary of City Health Officer Fixed.

The city council met in a called session yesterday afternoon, Mayor Maloney, Aldermen Covey, Derden, Fountain, Henderson and Edge, and Secretary Hines being present.

Having been authorized at a previous meeting to borrow some money for the use of the city under certain contingencies, Mayor Maloney reported that after investigation he had ascertained that it was not necessary to do so.

The petition of certain citizens praying for the removal of the wagon scales along side the M. H. James drug store, and near the Brazos Valley Horse and Mule Barn having been referred to the committee on ordinances, Alderman Henderson in behalf of the committee reported that the report had not been completed, whereupon he committee was granted further time.

M. H. James appeared before the council and asked permission to use the streets for material for his new building on the corner of Anderson and Bryan—Granted.

Mayor Maloney reported that he and Judge Doremus had gone to Austin and secured the Comptroller's approval of the Refunding, the City Hall and the Water, Light and Sewer bonds. Also that the Comptroller had destroyed the old bonds for which the Refunding bond were substituted.

A motion of Alderman Covey that the mayor be instructed to sell the City Hall bonds elicited considerable discussion. Mayor Maloney preferred that a special committee be entrusted with this duty. He said however that if the council insisted that he would sell the bonds, and it was so ordered.

During this discussion Mayor Maloney expressed the opinion that the council should at once make provision for putting in a sewer system beginning in the business district. Some of the aldermen were of the opinion that provision for a permanent water supply should be made first. No action was taken on this proposition. In this connection His Honor suggested the construction of a large reservoir in some convenient watershed for the storage of the flood water.

Alderman Henderson moved that an advertisement be inserted in The Bryan Eagle for one week asking for bids for the sale of the City Hall block, reserving the right to reject any and all bids. This proposition was discussed with much spirit and at considerable length. When the show-down came a majority voted for it and it was so ordered.

Mayor Maloney reported that he had hired, wagon, team and driver on Main street. The council approved to clean off the loose dirt and rubbish this action.

The matter of contractors leaving rubbish of all kinds in the streets after the completion of a building was discussed and it was decided that the ordinance relating to obstructions and encroachments covered the case and the Marshal was directed to see that the law was complied with in future.

Motion carried to extend the fire limits south on Bryan street to the I. & G. N. railroad, then west with said road to Redtop street and north on Redtop to present fire limit line.

A resolution was passed that the city join the county in the payment of the salary of the County and City Health Officer, each to pay the sum of \$200 per annum.

A motion was passed that the Mayor postpone the sale of the \$5,000 refunding bonds.

The bills were read and those properly audited were ordered paid.

Coupons 1 to 12 amounting to \$120 same being interest on the West side school bonds, were destroyed in open council, they having been paid.

Adjourned.
