PRESIDENT TO RESUME TOUR

Gregory, Texas, Oct. 22.—President Taft, refreshed by his four days of rest and recreation on his brother's ranch, resumes his tour this evening with his departure for Houston, where he is scheduled to spend three hours tomorrow morning. The program in Houston is to include a breakfast by the prominent business men, after which the President will make a public address. Many of the residents of Galveston, which is but fifty miles distant, are expected to join in the celebration at Houston.

From Houston the President's special will make a daylight run tomorrow, and the probabilities are that the President will make several brief stops at some of the larger cities and towns before Dallas is reached at 5:30 o'clock in the evening. In Dallas a public address will be delivered at the Texas State Fair grounds and in the evening the President will be the guest at a banquet given by the Dallas business men. The President will remain in Dallas over night, leaving for St. Louis early Sunday morning.

THAT AMARILLO RANGER TROUBLE

ALLEN AND STEELE FARMS INSPECTED

BETTER CONDITIONS FOUND BY
THE GREER SUBCOMMITTEE
THAN ON OTHER FARMS
VISITED.

CONVICTS HAVE NO COMPLAINT

Are Not Punished Unless It is Deserved, and Have Plenty of Food and Comfortable Quarters.

Navasota, Texas, Oct. 21.—At the Allen farm, owned by the estate of the late Col. John D. Rogers of Galveston, and the Steele farm, owned by W. L. Steele of Navasota, and cultivated by the state convicts under contract, Senator Greer's sub-committee of the Legislative Investigating committee found that the contractors had furnished quarters which are better in some respects than those at other share of contract farms thus visited, and that the state's officers in charge had made a better showing in the care of these places.

Ready for Committee.

According to the convicts at Allen farm, it has been known for some time that this committee was coming some time before the first of the year, and things had been put in better order than usually they are; for instance, they said that the shucks which had been used for filling the mattresses had been taken out and burned up and straw substituted only two days before the arrival of the committee, clean bed clothing put on, the floors scoured and that the prison building had been whitewashed a week ago.

Convict Testimony Favorable.

The convict testimony was entirely favorable to the sergeant in charge and to most of his guards. There was some testimony unfavorable to one of the guards now in the service; the convicts said that he had cursed them, and that when they started to work they ran out of the building because they were afraid that if they didn't move fast they would be kicked on the shins. When this guard was placed upon the stand he readily admitted that upon certain occasions he had cursed convicts, but he denied that he had ever kicked any of them.

Have to Move Fast.

Convicts denied that they were made to run upon the turn rows, but some of them added "They make all of us go at a pretty peart gait, and we short-legged fellows have to run to keep up."

The Allen and Steele farms are in charge of brothers, Sergeants W. W. Loftin and F. E. Loftin. The former has been in the penitentiary service thirteen years, and has been in charge of the force on the Allen farm since March, 1908. The latter has been in the penitentiary service seven years and has had charge of the force on the Steele farm four years.

Compliment Capt. Loftin.

Members of the committee said that Capt. W. W. Loftin showed a more thorough conception of the purposes of the penitentiary and a more intimate acquaintance with the rules than any sergeant that had thus far testified before the committee, and that the building equipment and care of same at the Steele farm was the best they have thus far seen.

BONUS IS NOW READY

Executive Committee Officially Notified Mayor Maloney That Bonus Was Ready.

A meeting of the executive committee of the Retail Merchants Association, representing the citizens of Bryan in the matter of the trolley line to the College, was held Wednesday night at which Mayor Maloney, the promoter, was present. The committee officially notified Mr. Maloney that the bonus was in bank and subject to his order when the road was completed and in operation.

Mr. Maloney began yesterday morning to solicit subscriptions to the capital stock and met with good success. During the day he was summoned to Dallas to meet with the board of directors of the A. and M. College, now in session there, and left for Dallas last night. The board of directors will take for the college \$10,000 of the stock.
