PRESIDENT TAFT AT COLLEGE.
Made Brief Address to Students, Com-
plementing Their Fine Appear-
ance.

The special train rushing President Taft and party from Houston to Dallas made a five minutes stop at College at 12:55 today to give the cadets and College people an opportunity to see the president, and to give him an opportunity to make the corps a short talk.

A great many Bryan people went out to see him and the crowd was swelled by many from the surrounding country.

The corps of cadets, 808 in number,

were drawn up in company formation along beside the track and as the President's train came to a stop, the College band played Dixie and the cadets responded lustily. The president stepped out upon the rear platform, wearing a grey sack suit and a smile that won't come off and spoke as follows:

"Young gentlemen when I look at you, this splendid body of young men, I am convinced they raise good men in Texas as well as other things. I am glad to have this opportunity to see you and glad to look into your faces. I am glad you have the opportunity to gain the practical training given by this college under the direction of the state. We have gone a long

way in building up state schools, and they are a great help to our young men. They help them to do things right now. Those who have the opportunity to attend these schools can go at once into the things they intend to do all the time. Engineering, farming and other practical training given here can be put to use at once and without going far. I have lately traveled over a great portion of your state and when it is developed and the great systems of irrigation are put into practice, you will make a state so great that you will not know what to do with it. Goodbye."

The train was rolling away as the president said goodbye and he retired with his genial smile into his car.

The train passed slowly through this city without stopping, and the president came out on the platform and waved to the cheering crowds.

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 23.—Late yesterday afternoon two masked white men entered the home of J. D. Barrantine, a farmer, near Mesquite, and finding the 16-year-old daughter Lena at home, the others being at work in the field, the men demanded money and the girl assured them none was in the house.

They proceeded to ransack the premises and the girl stabbed one intruder with a hat pin.

The robbers secured the girl, bound gagged her and wrapped her in a blanket.

They then chloroformed her and left her unconscious.

She was in this state when members of the family returned.

She was not seriously injured.

The robbers were trailed by bloodhounds a short distance, but so far have not been arrested.

The house was ransacked but the robbers secured nothing of value.
