We have been laying low low ever, thinking some of our subscribers would find a sure enough "dinger," and this afternoon it came in. Mr. E. J. Fountain brought to the office from the Fountain Bros. farm in the bottom a "yellow yam" that weighed 14 pounds 2 ounces. It is the biggest sweet potato ever brought to Bryan and the Eagle challenges the state to beat it. It was expressed to Mr. F. W. Steep Hollow Methodist Church.

A church conference of the new Steep Hollow Methodist church was held yesterday afternoon at the residence of Mr. B. G. Bond, near Wixon. Bro. Morris of Bryan, preached and presided over the conference. There were six additions to the organization. An organ for use in worship is to be purchased immediately. Some time next year a site is to be chosen and a new house of worship is to be erected. With less than thirty members about \$100.00 has already been subscribed for support of a pastor next year.

BRIGHT STUDENT KILLED BY BALL

Burnet Boy Struck on Head While Serving as Catcher.

Burnet, Texas, Nov. 5.—Robert Atkinson, a very bright student of the Burnet high school, was struck on the head yesterday afternoon with a baseball while engaged as catcher in a game, from the effects of which he died at an early hour last night.

INOCULATING FINE CATTLE.

Dr. Mark Francis, State Veterinarian, Doing Great Work at A. and M. College.

College Station, Texas, Nov. 5.—Dr. Mark Francis, professor of veterinary science and surgery, and his assistant Dr. R. P. Marsteller, at the A. and M. College of Texas, have four fine specimens of cattle in their hospital at the college, for inoculation against Texas fever.

One of these is a roan short horn bull, one year old, weight 1000 pounds and valued at \$1000. This animal was bred in Illinois, sired by Columbia Lad and was the grand champion at the Texas State Fair at Dallas this year. It is now owned by V. O. Hildreth of Aledo, Texas.

They have also two Jersey heifers from Lake county, Ohio for Richard Eckhardt of Yorktown, Texas, and a Jersey bull from Menter, Ohio, owned by Ed S. Darden of Bryan.

Dr. Francis has done more in regard to Texas fever than any veterinarian in this country. The mortality was formerly about seventy-five or eighty per cent, but under the system of inoculation followed at the A. and M. ninety-two per cent of the animals are saved. A large number of the finest cattle in the state are sent to the College every year for inoculation.

Colored Methodist Conference.

Two Methodist Annual conferences, both for the colored people, are to be held in Bryan this fall. One is the Texas Conference of the M. E. Church, presided over by Bishop T. B. Neeley, white, of New Orleans. The Zion church, to be presided over by Bishop Evans Tyree, colored, of Nashville, Tenn.
