#### TEXAS RIBBON CANE

Grows 10 to 12 feet high, about the size of a man's wrist. Growth is rapid and vigorous. Seeds springy at top of tassal. Has the general appearance of a large, vigorous variety of the sorghum family, but differs radically from sorghum in many ways. Sorghum is sweeter at top joint, ribbon cane is sweeter at bottom. In grinding and cooking there is no sorghum smell so much in evidence in making sorghum syrup. I found the cane and syrup on exhibition at the Mississippi Fair at Jackson in the fall of 1907. I make a specialty of "Home Made Louisiana Cane Syrup" and will put up about 2,000 gallons of it this season and will also plant largely of the ribbon cane, as many of my patrons prefer ribbon cane syrup to the Louisiana cane syrup. It will grow on any kind of good land or on thin land fertilized some. I have tried it on thin, sandy and heavy, black land with success. I am informed that it will fully mature before frost as far north as southern Ohio. I planted April 15 and harvested crop September 10. The yield was at the rate of 300 gallons per acre. Four quarts of seed is more than sufficient to plant an acre. In well prepared ground drop 3 to 5 seed 10 inches apart in rows about four feet apart. Chop to a stand like cotton and then work like corn. Work into syrup as soon as seed matures.—W. O. L., Amite County, Mississippi.

#### WANTS TO TRADE PARTIES.

#### New President Will Try to Win the South by Appointing Democrats to Office.

The New York American has just published a very interesting letter from its Washington correspondent discussing what the writer, Alfred Henry Lewis, supposes will be President Taft's Southern policy. It may be a creation of the fertile brain of an imaginative writer or it may be a prophecy. In either case it will be read with interest by both Democrats and Republicans in the South. Here is what Mr. Lewis says:

Mr. Taft is meditating the original in connection with the South. Mr. Dickinson, his war secretary from Tennessee, is a Democrat who never voted for Mr. Bryan, and appears in the balcony of his destinies at stated intervals to reilluminate the world thereon. That reillumination is by suggestion of Mr. Taft. He wants all men, especially all Southern men, both to understand and appreciate the democratic heretofore of Mr. Dickinson.

For this reason, in the flood of appointments which—even as did the dam at Johnstown—is to presently break forth, sweeping the amazement of mankind before it, hundreds of those which go to the South, postmasters, judges, marshals, district attorneys and collectors, will go to dwell in the wood democracy.

Such appointments will be deflected by Mr. Taft, should they be shadowed by public sentiment to the extent that calls for defense, upon the argument of competency and public good. The colored man in this way will be greatly given the appointive body. Not because he's colored but because, if not made his, not so it as the white democrat whom Taft will prefer.

These democrats whom Mr. Taft intends calling upon to fill offices of the South will in each elevated instance be by the standard of their region—of the individual. Yes, Mr. Taft will say nothing of politics, everything of public service and pretend to be blind, deaf and dumb as to what his selections have been, are, or will be politically.

"The public interest" that will be his watchword, and he will talk of "patronage" as well as "patronism" and how inferior are the claims of the machine to those of the nation at large. All this will be done the Taftian method. But underneath will hide the hope that by the appointive method he will influence the whole democracy of the South and by that means bring about the republican revolution.

To be sure if this device means a reality, the colored brother will be driven out of the party. Mr. Taft counts that but will contend that such a thing being incidental, it has beyond his power to prevent. As president he must think of keeping our party intact.

If the colored brother goes it will be by his own motion. Mr. Taft will not let him go. Also, if his party wants to get a quarter of the South out, Mr. Taft would be too proud to let the colored man to stay. The public service is not to be prostituted to any other purpose of keeping the colored vote inside the republican lines.

In brief, Mr. Taft—always remembering the general good—is willing to swap bodily the republican for the democratic party of the South, as farmers swap horses for a fair.

It is a great thought, a brilliant thought, and if Mr. Taft should be able to accomplish it—which he

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Bryan:

That an election for City Officers, to wit: Marshal, Secretary and three members of the City Council, shall be held by the qualified voters of said City, at the County Court House in Bryan on the first Tuesday in April next, it being the sixth day of said month; and the presiding officer, together with such others as he may appoint, shall hold said election in accordance with the City Charter and Ordinances and the State Law governing elections.
