**YELLOW FEVER.**

The Fever Increases in the City of New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, August 24.—One hundred and ninety-three new cases to-day, and forty-two deaths. High Irvine, chief operator in the Western Union Telegraph office in this city, died to-day of yellow fever after six days' illness.

Total cases for the week, 801; total deaths to date, 1006; total deaths for the week, 311; to date, 577. There is no explanation of the increase of new cases to-day other than the spread of the disease. The report contains not less than five times as many cases as those of the two preceding days. From noon to 6 p. m. 105 new cases had been reported at the office of the board of health, indicating a still larger number of new cases for to-morrow than were reported up to noon to-day.

**Fever Spreading in Vicksburg.**

VICKSBURG, August 24.—The fever continues to spread. Doctors Hunt and Booth are prostrated. There are 40 negro cases.

**Canton Mississippi, Depopulated.**

CANTON, August 24.—Our town is depopulated. Only one hundred are left out of thirty-five hundred.

**Doomed Grenada.**

GRENADEA, August 24.—Doctor Vezale, and Judge Walton, chairman of the relief committee, were stricken with fever yesterday. The negroes are falling like sheep.

**Fever Increasing at Memphis.**

MEMPHIS, August 24.—The fever is increasing. New cases during the past twenty-four hours, 105; deaths, 19.

**The Sanitary Reports Received at Washington, D. C.**

WASHINGTON, August 24.—The following is an abstract of the sanitary reports received the past week, under the national quarantine act.

NEW ORLEANS.—There were 771 cases of yellow fever and 235 deaths, making in all 1006 cases and 304 deaths. During the 24 hours to noon yesterday 121 new cases and 40 deaths.

VICKSBURG.—At least 100 cases of fever from August 18th to yesterday evening, and 40 deaths. During the last 24 hours, 50 deaths. Dr. Booth, in charge of the Marine Hospital service at that port, telegraphs: "I am sick. It is impossible to procure accurate data."

MEMPHIS.—One hundred and forty-four cases and 50 deaths during the six days to Friday evening.

CANTON.—The first case occurred at Canton on the 14th of August. Up to yesterday evening, 15 cases and 8 deaths.

PORT GRENADA.—One hundred and eighteen cases and 2 deaths up to yesterday morning.

LOUISVILLE.—The engineer of the steamer Golden Rule was admitted to the hospital, with yellow fever, and about another case, probably yellow fever, from Memphis.

MORGAN CITY.—One case, August 1st; 100 died from New Orleans.

OCEAN SPRINGS.—Three cases and one death imported.

ST. LOUIS.—Four refugees died of yellow fever at St. Louis during the past week.

LOUISVILLE.—Four river boatmen, suffering from yellow fever, are under treatment in an improvised hospital on the Marine Hospital grounds. Were admitted from the steamer John Porter, Southwester and Golden Crown, on the 17th and 18th instants.

MOBILE.—The cases reported as yellow fever on the 15th of August, is officially announced as a mistake.

KEY WEST.—No yellow fever.

GRENADEA.—So many of the remaining population are stricken with the fever that definite information cannot be obtained.

KEY WEST.—Sixty deaths from fever and six of small-pox for the week ending August 17th.

MANTANAS.—There is a decrease in the cases of yellow fever. Only five American vessels were in the port August 10th, and all of them have either had or were having cases on board.

**Suspension.**

HARRISBURG, Ky., August 24.—McBryer, Secretary of the State, has suspended. Liabilities, seventy-four thousand, assets, ten thousand.

**Bankrupts.**

CHICAGO, August 24.—R. C. Clark has gone into bankruptcy. Liabilities \$107,000; no assets.

**Leet's Condition.**

NEW YORK, August 24.—John E. Leet, who is confined in the Bloomingdale Asylum is still suffering, acutely physicians say he will recover in a few weeks.

**Saratoga Races.**

SARATOGA, August 24.—First race, three quarters of a mile was won by "Lady Darcy," second, "Albion," third, "Lettie," third, time, 1:36.

Second race, free, handicap, 3 year olds, one and a quarter mile dash, won by "Danchoff," second, "Pilot," Time 2:30.

Third race, "Parole" beat "Hattie" a mile and a quarter dash. Time, 2:14.

Fourth race, one mile dash, "Nanaimo II." winner; second, "W. J. Higgins"; third, "Owens." Time, 1:42.

Fifth race, free, handicap, steeple chase, two three quarter mile dashes, won by "Dead Head," second, "Walker," third, "Derby." Time, 4:33.

SARATOGA, August 24.—The Railroad managers have adopted resolutions favoring pooling arrangements which may hereafter be decided.

**Bank Statement.**

NEW YORK, August 24.—The weekly statement of the New York banks shows the following changes: Loans, increase, \$1,428,000; specie, decrease, \$271,000; legal tenders, decrease, \$319,000; deposits, decrease, \$1,700,000; circulation, decrease, \$20,000; reserve, decrease, \$242,000. Banks now hold \$19,780,475 in excess of legal requirements.

**\$1900 for Yellow Fever Sufferers.**

NEW YORK, August 24.—The Chamber of Commerce relief committee has received \$1900 for yellow fever sufferers.

**The Potter Committee.**

NEW YORK, August 24.—The Potter Committee to-day had W. J. B. Abner, Governor of New Orleans, before it, who testified that he had charge of the Registration Bureau in 1874, and that his bureau ascertained that the number of fraudulent registrations in New Orleans amounted to 35,000, and officials had been made against 5000. Witnesses said that many of the Republican agitators of the election and registrars were non-residents and fugitives from justice, and in several cases were under indictment.

## Fight With the "Moonshiners."

NASHVILLE, TENN., August 24.—The revenue officers report an engagement with an armed band of illicit distillers in Overton county, headed by Campbell Morgan. The officers were under fire forty-five minutes. Phillip Pippin and a Mr. Smith were wounded. Commissioner Rambo has given collector Woodcock authority to send enough men to capture the "moonshiners," which he is now preparing to do.

**Chicago Sends \$2500.**

CHICAGO, August 24.—Subscription aggregating \$2500 was made at the Board of Trade today for the benefit of the fever-stricken cities in the South.

**Commencement.**

PHILADELPHIA, August 24.—A largely attended meeting of the members of the Philadelphia bar, held to-day to take action on the death of Henry Armit Brown. After referring remarks by those present, eulogistic resolutions were adopted, and a committee appointed to communicate a copy to the family of the deceased. The funeral took place this evening at 4 o'clock.

**Failure.**

PHILADELPHIA, August 24.—Rauhsberger's shoes, trunks in stock, goods are bankrupt. Liabilities, \$250,000.

**Congressional Nominations.**

ST. LOUIS, August 24.—The Democrats of the 6th Congressional District nominated J. R. Wadell; in the 9th District, Geo. F. Rathwell; in the 5th District, David Rice.

**MEXICO.**

**Views of the Mexican Secretary of War.**

NEW YORK, August 24.—A letter from Mexican secretary of War has no appreciation of trouble between his country and the United States. He thinks, however, the United States is unreasonable in insisting that Mexico could prevent Indians from crossing into their territory; as the United States show inability to prevent, or are without cartridges, in allowing Escobedo and his men to cross into Mexico with the avowed purpose of shedding blood.

**Attempt to Poison an Emperor.**

MADRID, SPAIN, August 24.—An attempt was made to poison the Emperor of Morocco, and he is very ill in consequence.

**A Strike Among the Weavers.**

LOANING, August 24.—The weavers and spinners of thirteen cotton mills at Radcliffe struck against a reduction of wages 8 1/2 per cent. Thirty-five hundred looms are idle.

**Affairs in Germany.**

LONDON, August 24.—A special to the Manchester Guardian from Berlin says: The negotiations between Mons. Masala, the papal nuncio, and Bismarck have led to no result whatever. The Ultramarines will therefore continue to oppose the Government in the Reichstag.
