AN OVERLAND ROUTE.

From Shiner to The Mountains. An Interesting Journey.

(CONTINUED)

June 13th, 1901.

This morning at 11 o'clock we left Waco Springs and drew gradually up into the mountains and the scenery is grand and beautiful. We drove about ten miles along the bank of a clear, running stream, which we had to cross seven or eight times at different points with the rocks hanging over us from 200 to 500 feet high, some of them as big as a house and looked like they would tumble down every minute. We regret that we did not have a camera along so that we might have preserved some of these beautiful views. The houses and fences are nearly all built of rock; the crops raised are alfalfa, wheat, oats, and clover. The timber consists of walnut, pecan, silver pine and cedar. We are now camped close to the house of a gentleman by the name of Marshall who visited us in our camp and invited us to his house and showed us some beautiful samples of grain grown on his place.

Half a mile from here is the village of Sattler, where there is a store, saloon, hall, school, park and gin and where you can obtain every accommodation. It is in Blanco county. We are so well pleased, we do not think of turning homeward for ten days yet.

We left Sattler this morning, June 14th and passed through the finest part of the mountains and saw some grand sights. After traveling about 12 miles we came to the Giant Mountain, said to be several hundred feet high. It is in the shape of a camel, with a flag on the highest part, placed there by the government. It took us two hours to reach the summit, from which the view was grand and beautiful. After resting some time we returned to the valley, took a little refreshment and passed on to the village of Fisher, where we camped for the night. The next morning early we resumed our journey and after about 8 miles travel we reached the Blanco river which is a lovely mountain stream, thickly settled with farms and stock ranches.

We continued on our journey for about 15 miles when we arrived at the twin sister mountains. At the base of these is a little village with a post-office where I mailed this letter. About 2 miles farther on we came to another beautiful stream where we stretched our tents and will rest ourselves and horses for a day. We are having all the fish and squirrels we can eat.

After two days rest at Spring Branch, we broke camp and continued on our way. After a hard day's travel over rough roads, we finally came to the little village of Sisterdale about 7 o'clock in the evening. Here we found every accommodation the traveler could wish and we were especially well treated by Messrs. A. Langheim & Son, who do a large merchandise and saloon business in Sisterdale and to whom we are under many obligations. We can highly recommend them to any one traveling in this part of the country.

We also saw some very large cypress trees at Sisterdale - some of them measuring 3 to 8 feet in diameter. At Sisterdale the roads fork, one leading to Fredericksburg and one to Comfort. We left Sisterdale about 7:30 in the morning and arrived at Comfort at 12

o'clock noon. Comfort is a fine town; has fine buildings, fine water, and is surrounded by mountains. We are camped about a mile from town on a beautiful clear running stream, under the shade of some grand old cypress trees. We expect to remain here several days and have already met two of our old acquaintances, Otto Greibsch and Otto Baumann. Will write again soon.
