Cotton Steadies on New York Market Bulls Hold Sway on Chicago Exchange

NEW YORK, July 19.—The cotton market was heavy, but firm today and at the close, which was within a few points of the 11 to 11 1/2 points not higher. The market opened steady. Much showing was done today and others 1 to 1 1/2 points advance.

To the strength in Liverpool was added Wall Street buying and scattered local covering as a result of predictions for a heavy crop. The market was steady to a few points higher for the entire week. REDS FAIL TO PURCHASE ALL STUFF REPORTED

Bolshevik Agents Frequently Make Announcements for Publicity

BELTIN, July 19.—Russian trade has become a sort of will-o'-the-wisp to European newspaper men and American newspaper correspondents in the European capitals. Scarcely a day passes that some Bolshevik agent does not announce a gigantic contract entered into by the Russian government with some great concern, usually a German or English corporation.

At one time an announcement was made that 10,000 tractors were contracted for in Germany alone. When the report was run to ground it was learned that an actual deposit had been made on a contract for 100 tractors, and it cannot be learned that any of these have been delivered as yet.

One American concern which shipped 30 tractors to Russia without having any deposit on them still has the tractors in storage in Baltimore and there is no indication that the Soviet officials will fulfill their agreement to take them.

A British expert, who is representing many American firms in their efforts to get actual contracts with Soviet government, backed by substantial cash advances, told the correspondent: "I am done chasing after this threatened Bolshevik business. There have been some contracts signed. I know a few men who have sold the Bolshevik stuff which they actually had to have. I know men who have made a lot of money out of their business. But I know a lot more who have signed up wonderful paper contracts that never came to anything. That has been my experience. I have been able to get wonderful promises, but I couldn't get any gold, and I didn't want to have a lot of stuff stacked up in storage at Russia as many men have who have sold shipments into the Baltic without advance payments sufficient to insure the delivery and final payment."

GERMANS FAIL

German business men are apparently not enthusiastic about Russian business on the terms which the Bolshevik agents offer, and there is no disposition to execute wholesale contracts without something more definite in the way of payment than Soviet signatures. German papers continue to be sceptical about the possibility of trade with Soviet Russia, especially since the Soviet government has refused to grant admission to many German business representatives who have sought to make an investigation of economic conditions there.

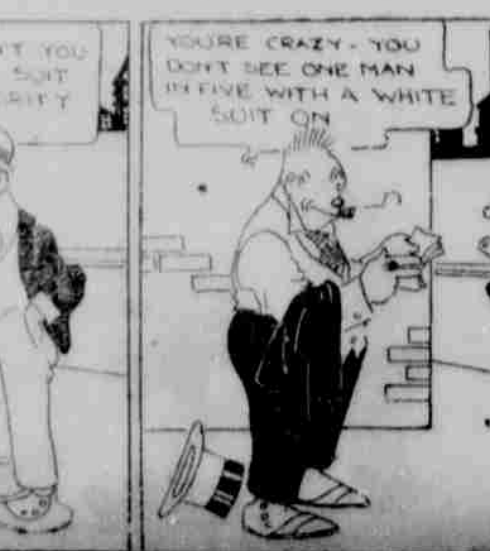
