SUPREME COURT LEAK LEADS TO 4 INDICTMENTS

Former Secretary of Justice McKenna Sold Tip on Decision For \$609 and Three Men Clear But \$1,412 on Deal; Is First True Bill Charging Violation of Secrecy on Advance Information.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—The government charged today with a leak to the public of the decision of the Supreme court in the case of the Texas-Oklahoma boundary dispute, which was made public by the publication of the decision in the New York Times. The government also charged that the leak was made by the former secretary of justice, McKenna, who sold a tip on the decision for \$609 and three men clear but \$1,412 on deal. This is the first true bill charging violation of the secrecy on advance information.

He believed that Wilson would refuse to sign the resolution and that the president's writings would aid the party in the next campaign, even though his physical condition might keep him from a stump tour.

PARLEYS OVER WAGE OF RAIL UNIONS BREAK

NAME RECEIVER TO TAKE CHARGE RED OIL LANDS

WASHINGTON, April 1.—The government today announced that it had appointed Jacob M. Dickinson as receiver of the Texas-Oklahoma boundary dispute. Dickinson, former secretary of war, will take charge of the lands. The U. S. Supreme court has stopped the clash between the two states and decreed that neither state must remove property from the scenes of activities.
