A Murderer Captured.

The Turner Hall Saloon Fight.  
The Recorder and a jury were busy this morning trying the participants in the fracas at George Hilger's saloon, on Friday last. Thomas Dasher, Theodoris Arts, George Hilger, M. H. Delphin and the two Wages brothers, were each charged with fighting and tried separately. Dasher, Arts and Delphin were dismissed, but George Hilger and the Wages brothers were each fined \$5. The case excited considerable interest and the court was crowded with auditors.

The Reporter's Prize.  
The committee to award the reporter's prize, the Hon. J. Weidner, Hon. J. R. Mason and Hon. T. J. Devine, met this morning in Judge Weidner's office, and all three gentlemen were present. They decided that as the reports were voluminous, each member of the committee should take home a set of papers, read them carefully, and meet to-morrow to make the award. The two prize silver cups have been placed in the hands of the chairman for presentation to the successful competitor.

# THE DOCTORS IN SESSION.

Steps Taken to Make the Meeting More Useful and Interesting.

The Texas Medical Association met last week in the County court room, Dr. Chaw being president.

On the report of the committee being called Dr. F. Herff presented a draught certificate of death for adoption by the City Council. He thought that the one formerly designed was too cumbersome for present circumstances. If a man died from diphtheria, tetanus, or was shot, it was immaterial what water or milk he took. It could only be useful in epidemic disease. Dr. King understood that the certificate had been devised by the committee, and approved of by the association. These should be sent to the Council and referred to the Board of Health. Dr. Hadza wanted the Board of Health to take charge of the matter and report it to the City Council. Dr. King opposed this, as it would, in his opinion, declare the association a nuisance. Dr. Herff wanted the matter to be dropped, but Dr. Tyler could not agree to this, for the simple reason that if the certificate had any merit it should be dealt with. Dr. Hadza's suggestion was adopted and the Secretary was instructed to advise the Board of Health as to the action of the association.

Dr. Christian announced that he was preparing an important report upon the character of the city waters and asked that physicians who had typhoid fever patients would furnish samples of the water habitually drunk by the patients. He stated that so far as he had at present examined, the waters of the San Antonio river and San Pedro creek was far superior to the average well water.

Dr. Hadza thought the meetings were getting too proxy and wanted the association to return to its old form of reading essays at each meeting. Dr. Christian concurred, and moved that a subject be selected for discussion, and some one elected to lead it. Dr. Tyler moved as an amendment that a committee of five be appointed to select the subject for discussion and essayist for each meeting, and the amendment was adopted. The Chairman appointed Dr. Tyler, Dr. Hadza, Dr. Herff, Dr. F. Herff and Dr. Tyler as that committee, and after a brief recess those gentlemen reported the following exercises for the next meeting: Subject for discussion, Recurrence fever, essayist, Dr. F. Herff. The meeting then adjourned.
