

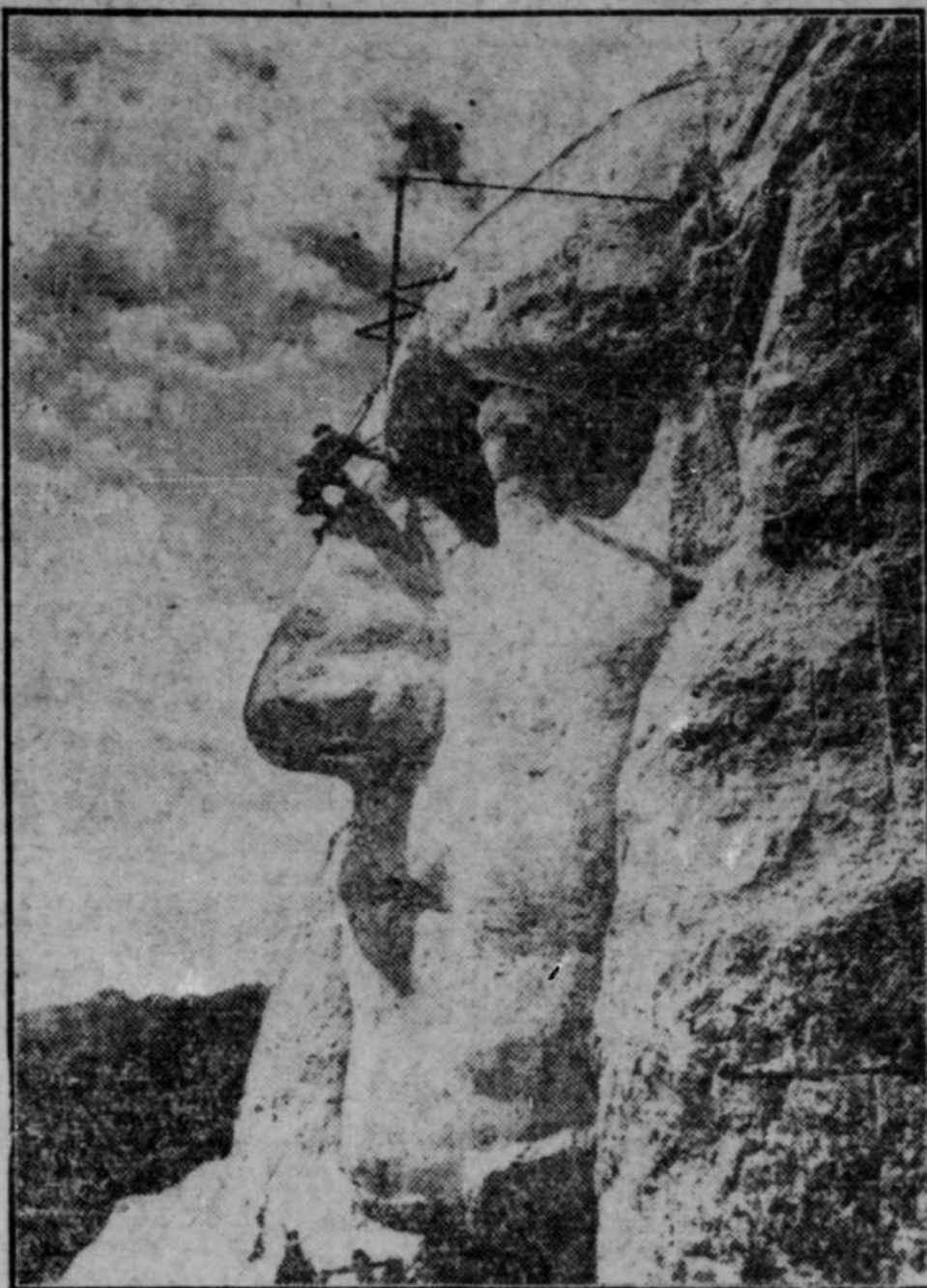

## WORK PROGRESSING ON MEMORIAL



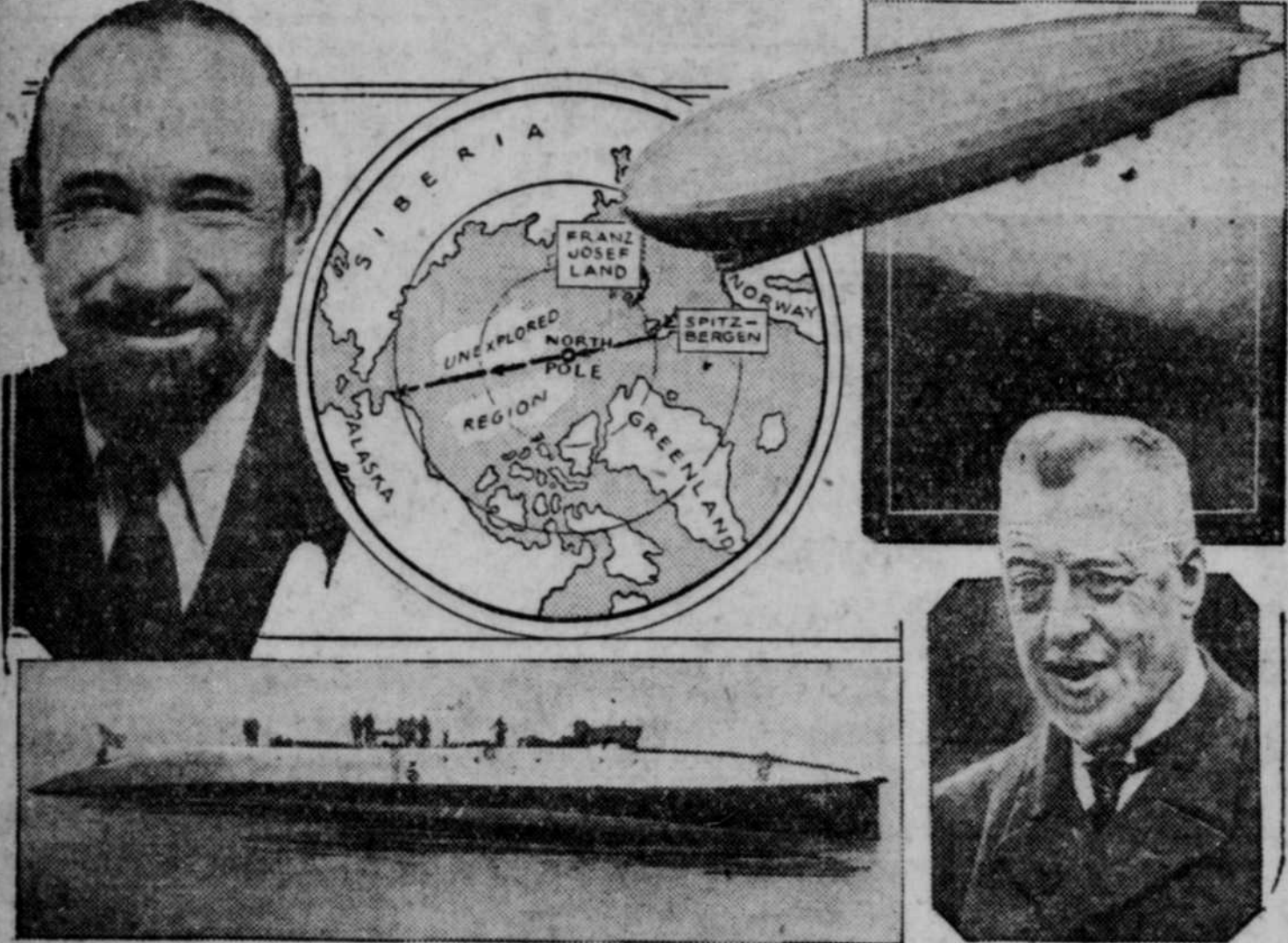

## GRAF AND NAUTILUS PLAN POLAR RENDEZVOUS



The German airship, Graf Zeppelin, expects to start from Friedrichshafen, Germany, in July and proceed to Spitzbergen where it will moor until the submarine Nautilus nears the north pole with Sir Hubert Wilkins' expedition. The Zeppelin and the submarine are expected to reach the pole at the same time. Sir Hubert Wilkins (left) is in command of the Nautilus and Dr. Hugo Eckener (right) is master of the Graf Zeppelin. The Nautilus will continue to Alaska while the Graf will return.

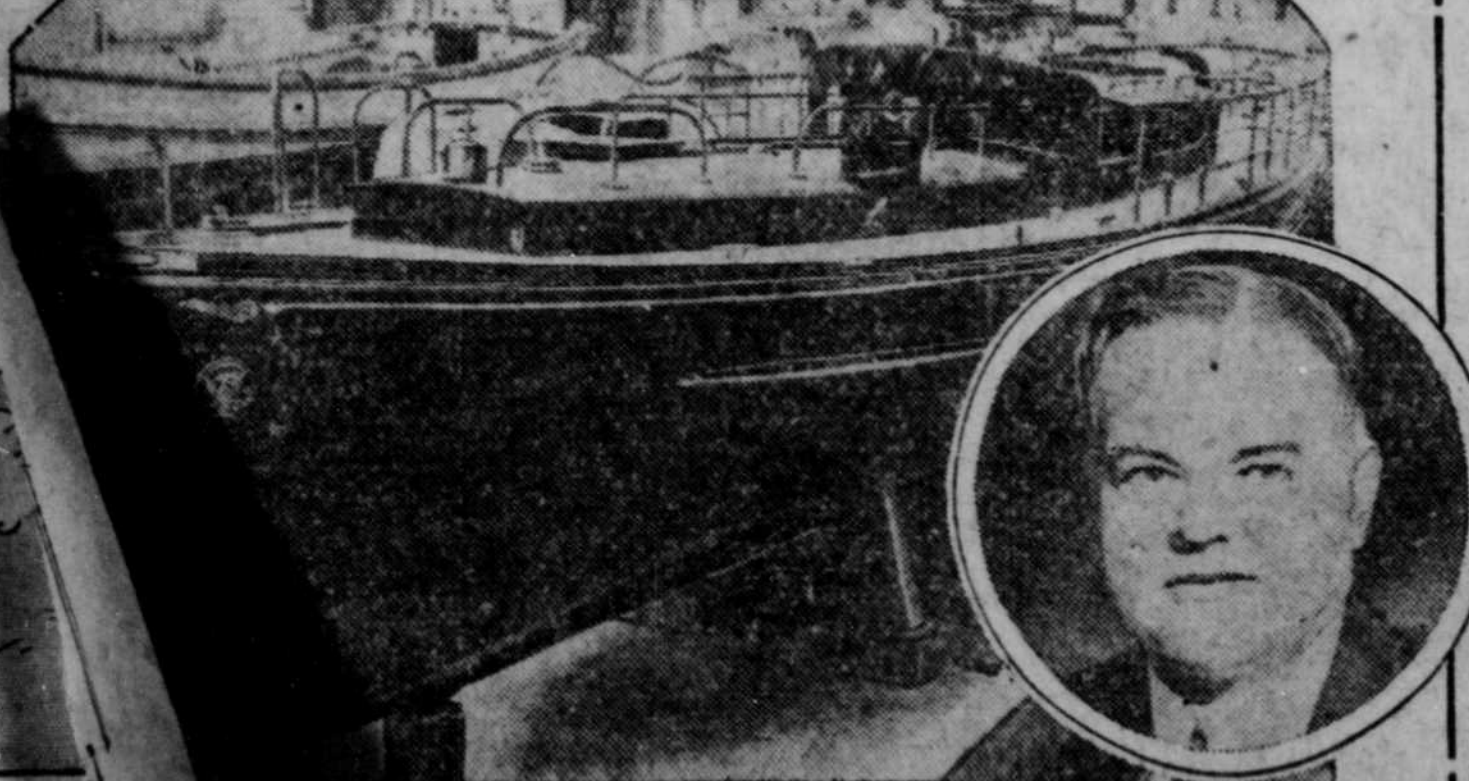
A recent picture of Elizabeth Morrow, daughter of Senator Dwight Morrow of New Jersey and sister of Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh.

## ALLEGED SWINDLER ARRESTED



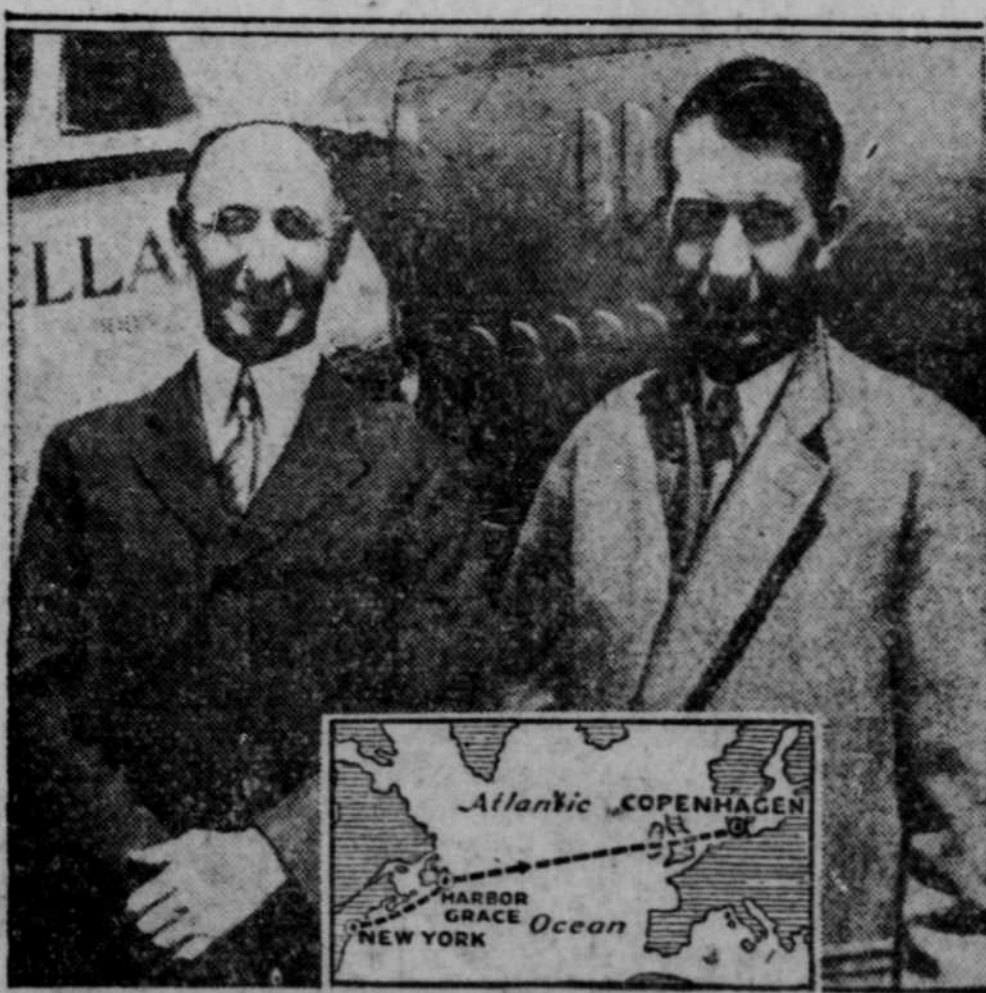

## DENMARK GOAL OF THEIR FLIGHT



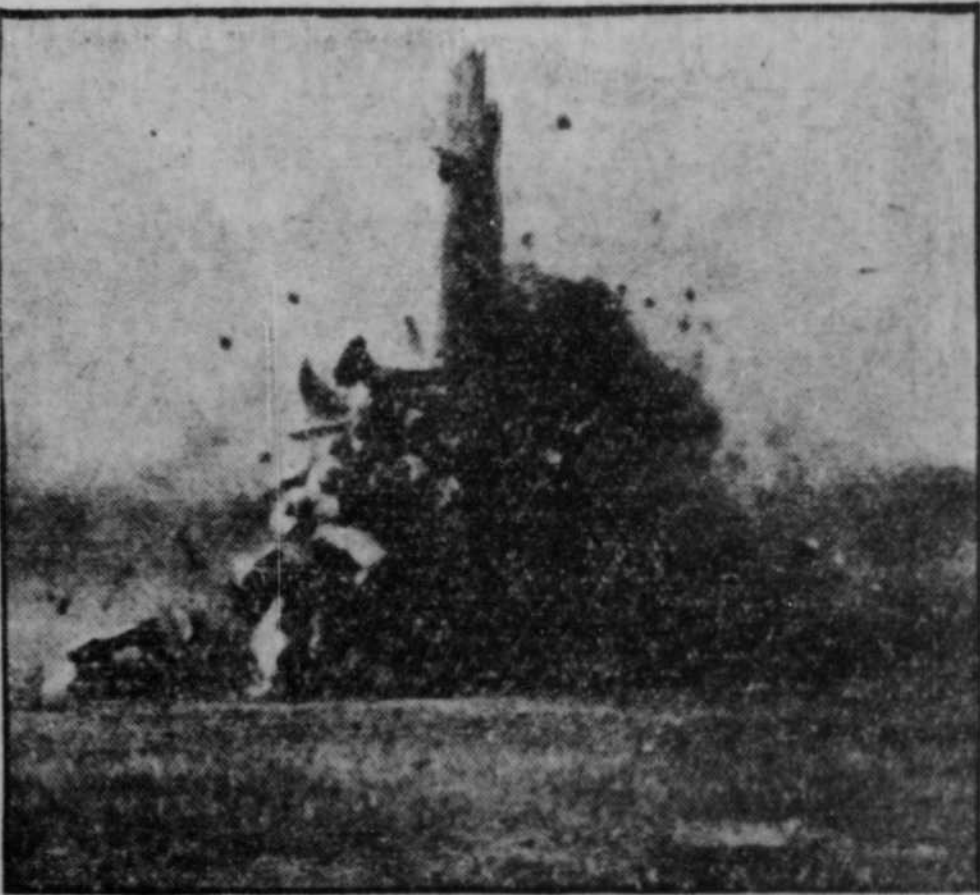
