

LONG AND CYR TO LET COURT SETTLE AFFAIR

BATON ROUGE, La., Oct. 16. (AP)—Louisiana's gubernatorial revolution apparently is going to be decided by battles purely legal.

Gov. Huey P. Long, the besieged, rested his armed guard of state highway police today following the announcement of his lieutenant-governor, Paul N. Cyr, chief pretender to the executive's chair, that he would leave the matter to the courts.

Cyr Avoids Trouble.

Cyr, who voluntarily took the governor's oath at Shreveport and demanded that Long abdicate because of his recent election to the U. S. senate, said last night he had "no intention of going to Baton Rouge to start trouble."

He made the announcement in a campaign speech at Alexandria (he is seeking election to the governorship in the next voting) and added he was going "to abide by decision of the courts because I am a law-abiding man."

The third claimant to the governor's office, Walter L. Aldrich, unemployed resident of Shreveport, who took the oath after Cyr and he, too, would file an ouster suit against Long, remained silent today. He previously said he was coming here to "take possession" of the office.

Meanwhile, there was an open session on the office of lieutenant governor.

Alvin O. King of Lake Charles, president pro tempore of the senate, was on the payroll as lieutenant governor after Long had Cyr's name struck off as he laid claim to the governorship. But he was only one of those who said the job was theirs. He has taken the oath.

It's Open Season.

L. D. Smith of Benton claimed he had as much right to the office as King and also took the oath to become "one of the lieutenant governors." E. H. Reed, a Shreveport grocer, remarked that times were "sort of hard" and that he also expected to take the oath for lieutenant governor because "the third governor ought to have a lieutenant governor."

Cyr is seriously continuing his denunciation of Long and his plans for filing his ouster suit. At the capitol Long called the situation a "comedy of modern politics."

Yesterday Long said his fear of an invasion of his administration by Cyr, should the chief executive leave the state, now was gone. "Cyr," he said, "is out."

PRECEDENT FAVORS GOVERNOR LONG

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. (AP)—Ample precedent exists for the position of Huey P. Long is retaining his post as governor of Louisiana after his election to the senate.

Half a dozen senators in the past are shown by records at the capitol to have continued serving as governors of their states after being chosen for the senate.

Sen. Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin, father of the present senator, chose to continue as governor more than a year after his election to the senate and nearly a year after his term began.

Others who did likewise were Sen. Johnson, republican, California; former Sen. David B. Hill, of New York; former Sen. Hoke Smith of Georgia; former Sen. James L. Aldrich, of Mississippi; and former Sen. Philip Allen, of Rhode Island.

COPS ROPE 'GATORS

Public Scorn Poised Against War Clouds

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. (AP)—The scorn of public opinion, mobilized through the Kellogg-Briand pact, is poised as the most powerful instrument of world powers against hostilities in Manchuria.

This treaty for the renunciation of war is looked on by the American government as the most formidable weapon against violation of world peace by Japan and China.

As it prepared to sit with the League of Nations for the first time in a major controversy, the American government had in mind that the Kellogg-Briand pact would be involved.

To Associate Self

As a party to that treaty and one of its sponsors, the United States is willing to associate itself with its application through any agency. Likewise, Sec. Stimson considers

that the league council provides the same machinery for consultation as is provided under the nine-power pacific treaty on which the American government is signatory.

At first hesitant to accept the league's invitation to sit with it because of Japan's failure to consent, the state department moved gradually toward its decision to participate.

China, through its Washington legation, announced its willingness for the United States to join in any league action.

Professors Rebuffed

Following reports that Japan had flatly rebuffed American professors to help preserve the peace through the Geneva organization, Sec. Stimson conferred at length with Ambassador DeBuchi. The latter later recommended to Tokyo that it give consent to this government's participation in any league action.

While there has been no official comment on the subject, it has been made clear informally at the state department that the United States would not associate itself with the application of any league sanctions.

State department officials look on a present application of the Kellogg-Briand treaty as merely a method of establishing a limit, the violation of which would mark the offending nation as the aggressor.

Continued and steady growth of the Christian Science movement was indicated by reports of its activities read at the recent annual meeting of the Mother church of the denomination.

The Mother church now has 2519 branch churches and societies throughout the world, beside 40 college and university organizations; 79 new branches having been formed during the past year.

Growth of healing and charitable work was also indicated by the reports; and an indication of a widening interest in the subject was shown by the statement that authorized lecturers on Christian Science addressed total combined audience of approximately 3,300,000 during the twelve months covered by the reports.

Six acres of land owned by The Mother church, and adjacent to its edifice (shown above), are now entirely free from debt; the remaining \$970,000 indebtedness having been liquidated during the year. A new publishing house, estimated to cost \$3,000,000, will occupy a portion of this ground; and work on this project will soon be started.

The three large charitable institutions maintained by the Christian Scientists, costing something over \$4,000,000, are also free from debt; and report of their successful management formed a part of the proceedings of the annual meeting.

The original edifice of The Mother church, shown at the right in the above etching, was erected in 1894 at a cost of \$200,000; and the extension (foreground) was completed in 1906, and cost \$2,000,000.

The present edifice of The Christian Science Publishing Society, left, was built in 1908 at a cost of \$200,000, and later enlarged. This plant is taxed beyond its capacity; hence the need for the new publishing house, above referred to.

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
