Cyr Avoids Trouble.

Cyr, who voluntarily took the overnor's oath at Shreveport and manded that Long abdicate bese of his recent election to the U. S. senate, said last night he had "no intention of going to Baton Rouge to start trouble."

He made the announcement in a mpaign speech at Alexandria (he seeking election to the governorship in the next voting) and added was going "to abide by decision of the courts because I am a law abid-

The third claimant to the gover-nor's office, Walter L. Aldrich, un-employed resident of Shreveport, who took the oath after Cyr and he, too, would file an ouster suit against Long, remained silent today. He previously said he was coming here to "take possession" of the

Alvin O. King of Lake Charles, resident pro tempore of the state senate, was on the payroll as lieuten-ant governor after Long had Cyr's name struck off as he laid claim to the governorship. But he was only one of those who said the job was theirs. He has taken the oath.




