STRONG GAMES UP IN SOUTHWEST CONFERENCE

TEXAS PLAYS OKLAHOMANS

Rice and S. M. U. to Clash At Houston; Aggies At T. C. U.

DALLAS, Oct. 16.—(P)—Football strategy in the Southwest conference is expected to permeate into a higher form Saturday. Three championship combats, in which the fires of tradition will burst into action, banner the program.
Conference touchdown manufacturers who will pit their scoring machines against each other include: Southern Methodist and Rice at Houston; Arkansas and Baylor at Waco, and Texas A. and M.—Texas Christian at Fort Worth.
Balancing the southwest card will be one interconference game. At Dallas, the University of Texas, 1936 conference champion, will stage its annual affair against the University of Oklahoma, a powerful Big Six conference unit.
Conference critics were jolted last week when Rice halted the University of Texas, 7 to 0. Although Southern Methodist has been established as the favorite, no one seems to be sure just what Rice will do to the Dallas school. Boasting a squad of sixty, Rice is capable of over-matching any team in the conference, player for player.

Interesting game
Promising to rival in interest the Southern Methodist and Rice conflict, is the Texas A. and M. and Texas Christian game at Fort Worth. It will be the first 1937 conference game for both A. and M. will invade Texas Christian's bowl with a fine team—the best in several seasons; a team that featured blocking and tackling in a 29 to 0 victory over the University of Iowa last week. The Frogs have left no stone unturned in their preparations to stop A. and M. A field goal gave them victory last year, and they have Ben Boswell to kick another one this year if necessary.
The University of Arkansas and Baylor game at Waco will bring together two of the alleged weaker members of the conference, although it will be Baylor's first conference set. They will take the field early favorites. The Arkansas backfield star, may not see action for Arkansas. He is nursing injuries.
The Texas-Oklahoma game will be overshadowed by conference tilts although it carries interconference color. Texas beat Oklahoma 17 to 7 last year. Rice, recent conqueror of Texas, two weeks ago lost a 19 to 6 game to Oklahoma.

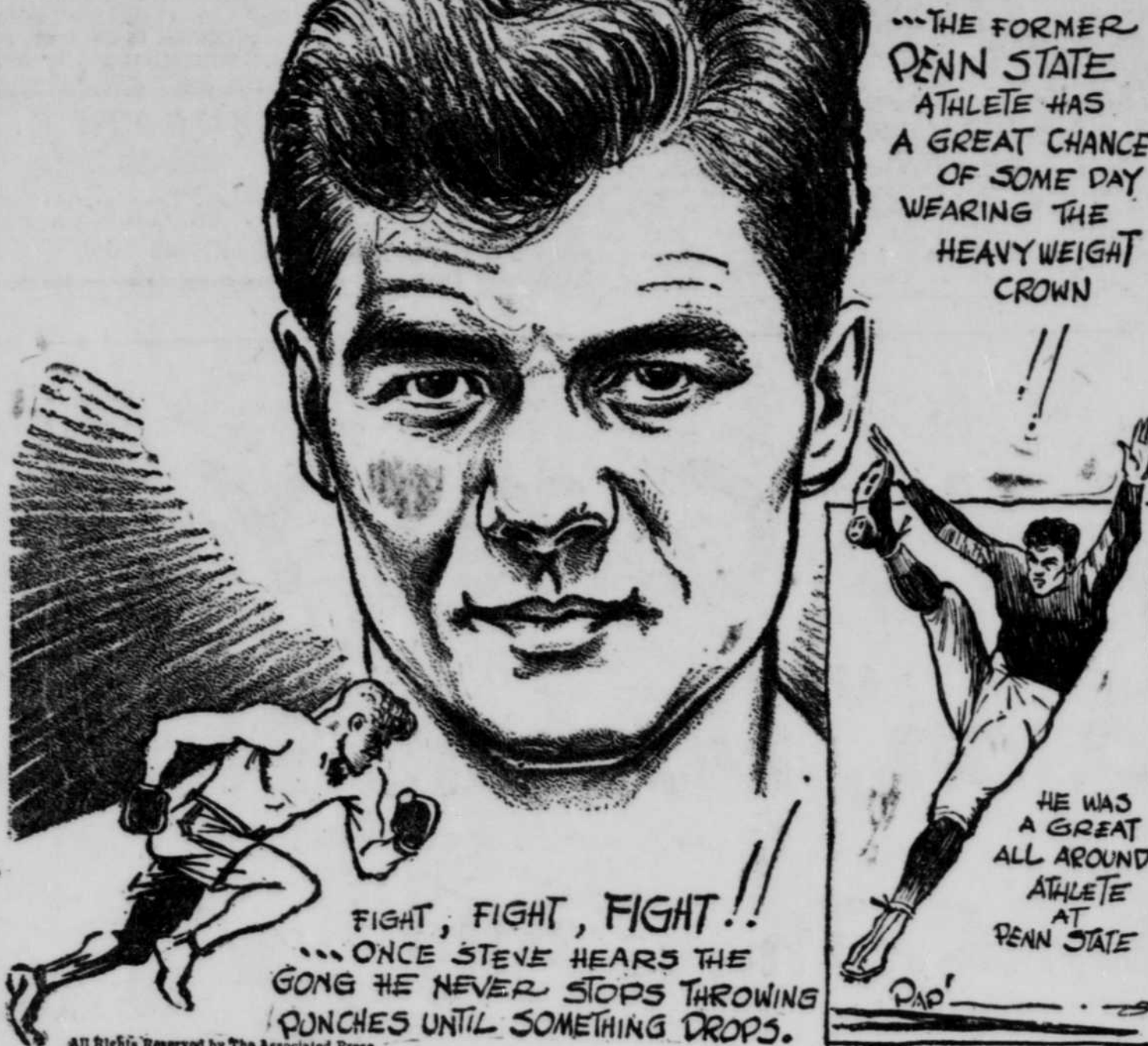

HOUSTON, Oct. 16.—Coaches Arnold Krichame, and Lamar Camp and their squad of undefeated John Reagan High Bulldogs left here Thursday morning for Brownsville where Friday afternoon they tangle with Coach "Red" Irvine's Brownsville High Golden Eagles in the outstanding game of the week in the Valley. A record crowd is expected to watch these two class A teams go through their paces.
Practically all of the John Reagan players saw Brownsville play here in 1929 against Port Arthur in a bi-district game. The boys were favorably impressed with the showing of the Eagles that day, and as the time for their game with Brownsville shortens, the Bulldogs are remembering the play of that strong team, and are prepared for a tough afternoon.
If the present Brownsville team is as strong as the '29 combination, then well and good for Reagan. They believe they're ready, and if it is not, then all the better.

CHARITY TILTS ARE LINED UP

Many Teams Volunteer For Contests With Money Going to Poor

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—(P)—Football's proposed helping hand to the unemployed had developed into a nation-wide movement today with volunteers from virtually every section of the country.
The program developed most rapidly in the east, where three days of tournaments already have been booked and others are in the making. Army and Navy will play in the Yankee Stadium here December 12 for charity's sake; Yale, Brown, Dartmouth and Holy Cross will compete in an elimination tournament at New Haven Dec. 5, while Princeton, Pennsylvania, Columbia and Cornell will be competitors in a similar tournament in the Yankee Stadium Dec. 9.
In the south, Tennessee's volunteers have lived up to their name by indicating their willingness to play for the fund, Mississippi A. & M. also announced it would be available.
The Big Ten conference still has the subject under consideration although that powerful group already has amended its by-laws to permit extension of the season from Nov. 21 to Nov. 28 for intra-conference games for charity. Six members are known to be in favor of a season charity games but the conference, as a group, has as yet taken no action.
In the Rocky Mountain conference, a charity game Dec. 5 at Denver tentatively has been booked although the contestants have not been selected.

HARD TUSSLES ARE EXPECTED

Brownsville To Get Lots Of Experience With Houston Squad

Two football games of major interest are scheduled in the Valley today.
The first will determine the strength and staying qualities of the Brownsville Screaming Eagles here when they take on John Reagan of Houston.
The second fray will give the rampant Donna Redskins the acid test. The Daileys rip into the Robstown Cotton Pickers at Donna. Donna has succeeded in making a race track of the Valley "B" race so far this season. The Pickers, however, hold a string of victories, including one win over the San Benito Greyhounds.
Twenty-one Reagan huskies swung off a rattler here last night and announced themselves in great shape for their fray with the Screaming Eagles. The squad won its district title last season and bids fair to come through again and go far in the district race this season. The squad is a lay one for a high school. Last week it defeated Bryan 20-0 and the week previous defeated McAllen 52-0.
The Screaming Eagles are determined to make a strong showing against the visitors. They've been pointing for the game for two weeks and are in good condition with exception of an injury to Miller Scanlan, regular guard. The game starts at 3:30 p. m. at Tucker field.

BO's Club Takes On Kan. Aggies

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 16.—(P)—The purple house of Kansas State College turns a characteristic Bo McMullin football threat against the Big Six champion Jayhawkers at Lawrence Saturday while Oklahoma and Missouri take up interconference rivalry in the southwest and the Redskins.
The only conference battle billed will give the Jayhawkers their initial 1937 test in Big Six competition, with the Aggies generally rating a slight edge, owing to their display of power in defeating Missouri last week, 30 to 7.
Oklahoma plays the Texas Steers, Southwestern conference champions, who drubbed Missouri, 31 to 0, two weeks ago and who beat the Sooners last year, 17 to 7, in their Dallas meeting which has become a feature of the Texas state fair.
The Oklahomaans defeated Rice Institute two weeks ago, 19 to 6, and Rice beat Texas, 7 to 0, last Saturday.

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YALE SURPRISE STAGG'S PLAN

Chicago Expected To Show Eastern University Trick Stuff

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—(P)—There is a lurking suspicion on Chicago's midway that Amos Alonzo Stagg is about due for another upset victory, and that Yale will be the victim tomorrow on Stagg Field.
Stagg's first surprise triumph was accomplished in 1905 when his Maroons defeated Michigan's great eleven, 2 to 0. More recently, he came up with the famous 21-21 tie with Illinois in 1924, and his last was a 15 to 8 victory over Princeton in 1929. He followed up with a 26 to 7 dazzer over the University of Washington the same season, but failed to connect last year.
For the occasion, the "old man" has wrought a new offense, in which Yale's tactics probably will get a good workout and passes will be used frequently. He has not neglected the Chicago defense, having gone so far as to prepare the freshmen teams in entirely different systems.
Plenty of footballs will be in the air at Madison, Wis., if Purdue and Wisconsin do as expected. Both elevens have been heaving the ball all week, and an air battle is almost certain.
Michigan and Ohio are ready for their struggle to remain in the Big Ten championship race. The Wolverines will spare nothing against the Buckeyes, as the rest of their schedule does not appear tough.
Iowa prospects were brightened yesterday when Randall Hickman, regular quarterback, returned to practice. The Indiana squad left last night for Iowa City at full strength for the first time of the season. Northwestern continues to think more about the Ohio State game a week from Saturday, than of the California (southern branch) game this week.

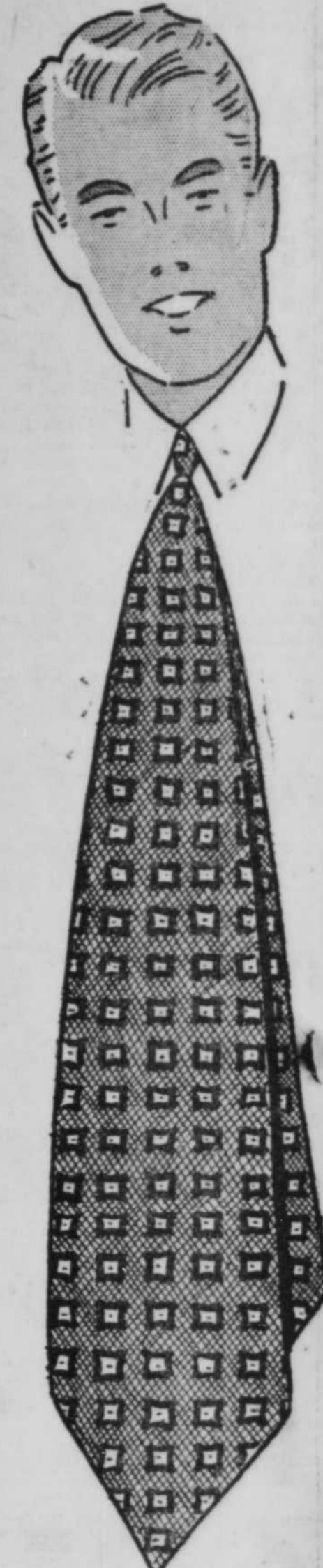
