ding Mr. Bergen's song recital one year ago will testify to the truthfulness of this statement as the memory of the splendid rendition given at the time still lingers pleasantly in the minds of all. In addition to being an artistic singer, Mr. Bergen has also achieved conspicuous success as a song writer and his "Song of the West," an Indian lyric which is said to portray the American Indian melodies more truly than any other work along similar lines, stands in a class of its own. His singing of "The Charge of the Light Brigade," appeared here took the house by storm.

The Leon-Marx Trio which accompanies Mr. Bergen this year is composed of Leon Marx, violinist, Mr. Hans Dressel, violoncellist and Mr. Carl Machlin, pianist. Their work both as a trio and as soloists will be an important part of the evening's program, as Mr. Marx is one of the most distinguished violinists in the country. Mr. Marx appeared with the Theodore Thomas orchestra for ten years, and at the age of twenty he held the position of first violinist in this famous organization and later on played solos accompanied by the Thomas Orchestra. Mr. Thomas himself has joined in the applause for encores for Mr. Marx solos. Mr. Marx, while in Berlin, competed with forty-eight musicians for a scholarship under Dr. Joachim and won the prize. The old doctor was so pleased with his able pupil's work that he presented young Marx with a rare old violin as a mark of appreciation of his genius. He was recently appointed assistant concertmeister of the Chicago Grand Opera company—one of the highest positions that can come to a violinist in this country.

Mr. Hans Dressel is equally eminent in his line as violoncellist, and he has appeared to splendid advantage both in this country and the countries in Europe. In Wales and at Oxford his playing so took the audience that by special request he arranged ensemble classes in concerted music, which are a special feature of his tuition. Mr. Dressel has played at Goodwood Castle, Stafford House, and at the late Duke of Richmond's the Royal Albert Hall, St. James' Hall, the Queen's Hall, and all the principal London and provincial concerts. He has the most flattering notices in most of the leading contemporaries in Germany and in England, Canada, East and Northwest of this country.

Mr. Machlin the pianist received his first training in the Cathedral Choir at Salisbury, England. He was for three years professor in St. Boniface College, Winnipeg, and has more recently been a teacher at the Chicago Musical College. He is also a composer.

Altogether the affair promises to be one of the most pleasant which the Colleges have yet arranged and the price has been set at the low amount of twenty-five cents the expectation of the Colleges being to place the prices of these entertainments at such a reduced figure that none may be deprived of the privileges of enjoying the same. The time of the entertainment has been set for 8 o'clock.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect on the 30th day of December, and shall be published in the manner required by law.
